The Prince was accompanied in his carriage by Robert Todd Lincoln, son of the martyred president, and Admiral Robley D. Evans.

At 2 o'clock the Prince and his suite departed for Milwaukee ifi a special train over the St. Paul road,

Milwaukee, Wis, Mar. 4 The geor-geomy special train bearing Prince Renry and his suite arrived at Malwaukee on schedule time this afternoon.

It is estimated that 50,000 crowded about the depot and adjoining streets auxious to catch a glimse of the distinguished visitor.

There was an official welcome by Mayor Hose and the citizens' committee, af ter which the visitors were escorted by cavalry and German societies to the exposition building where the afternoon's program was begun.

The big feature of the program is to be the banquet at the Pflster, at which covers will be laid for 250, in addition to the member of the Prince's party.
