**CHADWICK TRACT SOLD
TO WISCONSIN LUMBERMEN**

**Finest Body of Timber in This
Section to Be Devel-
oped.**

At the risk of being accused of trying to get up a boom, the MAIL is glad to give another piece of news of the greatest importance to Coos county and especially to Marshfield.

The Chadwick tract of timber and coal land, owned by Mrs. Chadwick, Sol. Hirsch and other Portland parties, has been sold to F. Bouton, Jr., a Wisconsin lumberman, and this spring will see the inauguration of the work of developing the property.

This tract lies west of the upper part of Isthmus slough and comprises 7020 acres of land, covered with fine timber and underlain with coal.

It has been held for a quarter of a century or more, by its recent owners, who would allow nothing to be cut on it and it is one of the finest bodies of timber on the coast.

Mr. Bouton, the purchaser, is a successful Wisconsin lumberman. His operations in that state having been curtailed in by the exhausting of the timber supply, he turned his attention to this coast. Coming to Coos, he has thoroughly examined the tract he has purchased, having spent the last week or so cruising and camping out on the land, undeterred by rain and bad weather.

The sale, the largest ever made in Coos, was negotiated by Dr. C. W. Tower, and it may be stated that a very satisfactory price was realized.

It is understood that Mr. Bouton has not bought this tract of land on speculation, but that he will now go ahead energetically with the development of the property. This means another large mill on the bay, and there is no reason to fear that it will be another Empire or Porter fiasco, the money of practical lumbermen has gone into the venture, and such people do not let their property lie idle.

Preserving Eggs and Butter

Many farmers all over the country are sending money to persons who advertise recipes for the preservation of eggs. Here is as good a way as any: In twelve pints of water put one pint of freshly slacked lime and one pint of common salt, mixing thoroughly. Fill a barrel or keg half full of this fluid, and with a dish let eggs down into it; they will settle right side up every time, and will keep for any reasonable length of time without further care only to keep them covered with the fluid. Strictly fresh eggs may be put up in this way any time after June. When one desires to preserve and keep butter for higher prices the following plan is very reliable and may be adopted with safety: To every 20 pounds of butter take 3 pounds salt, 1 pound loaf sugar and 1/2 pound pulverized saltpeter, mixing them thoroughly. Put in a layer of butter about 1/2 inches thick, then sprinkle on a light covering of the mixture, then more butter, alternating in this way till your cask is full. It should be packed in airtight casks. Butter preserved in this way will retain its sweetness and freshness for over a year.—Globe Democrat.

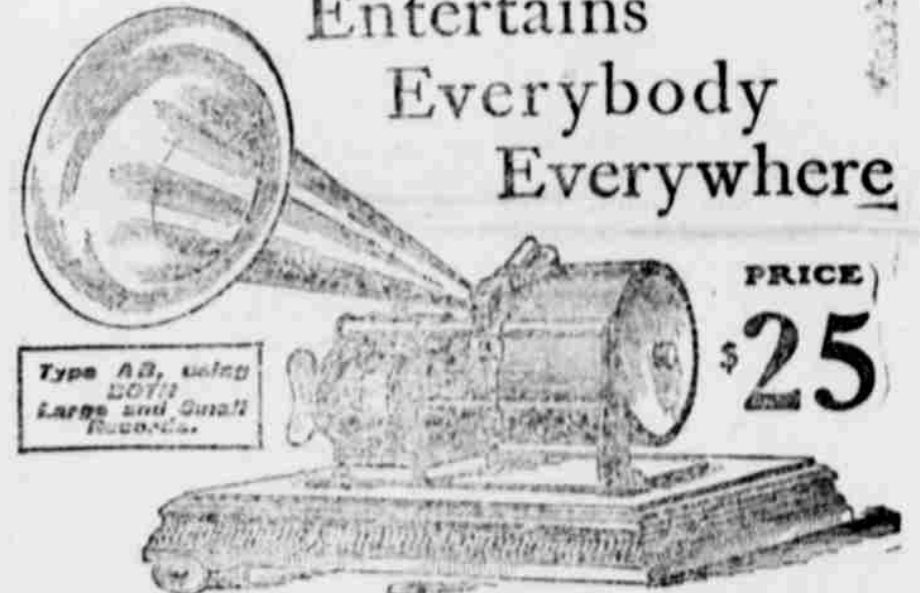
