COOS COUNTY DEMOCRATS PUT UP A TICKET

Proceedings of Wednesday's Convention—Some Surprises—Editor of Coquille Bulletin for Judge

The Coos County Democratic convention, which met in Odd Fellows' hall Wednesday afternoon was a harmonious body and everything passed off smoothly. The convention was called to order at 2 p. m.

Temporary officers were elected, as follows: John F. Hall, chairman; J. J. Lamb, secretary; J. J. Stanley, assistant secretary.

C. E. Nicholson, Frank Lowe and I. E. Rose were appointed a committee on credentials.

Walter Richardson, A. J. Sherwood and K. H. Hansen were appointed a committee on order of business.

A recess was then taken, awaiting reports of above committees.

The convention was called to order again at 3 o'clock.

The report of committee on credentials was read and approved; also the report of committee on order of business.

Temporary organization was made permanent.

C. F. McKnight and Chris Rasmussen were appointed tellers.

Nomination of candidates was next in order.

For representative Geo. Jackson named John Flanagan, and he was nominated by acclamation.

For county judge, J. T. Hall named J. M. Upton, J. J. Lamb named J. J. Stanley. The ballot resulted: Upton, 42; Stanley, 53, and Stanley was declared the nominee of the convention, the action being made unanimous.

For county clerk, L. H. Hazard was made the unanimous nominee without opposition and with applause.

For sheriff A. J. Sherwood placed J. S. Lawrence in nomination with a speech eulogistic of his administration as assessor. W. H. S. Hyde placed Knuch Holland in nomination. The ballot resulted: Lawrence, 81; Holland, 14, and Lawrence was declared nominated.

For treasurer, J. J. Lamb named Geo. O. Leach. Alex Hall named Wm. Turpen, but Mr. Turpen declined. Leach was nominated by acclamation.

For assessor, T. J. Thrift, A. P. Owen, K. H. Hansen and Geo. Norris were named. Mr. Owen declined. The first ballot resulted: Thrift, 73; Hansen, 11; Norris, 6. Made unanimous.

For surveyor, Alex Hall and C. E. Nicholson nominated each other, but both declined, and E. A. Rudstall was unanimously nominated.

For coroner, Geo. O. Leach named George Harris. Alex Hall named Chas. Bradbury. The ballot resulted: Norris, 19; Bradbury, 73; and Bradbury was declared the nominee.

For coroner Dr. Horsfall and Dr. Straw were named. Dr. Straw withdrew his name and Dr. Horsfall was nominated by acclamation.

For delegates to the state convention: John F. Hall, W. C. Sanderson, I. E. Rose, J. W. Flanagan, E. E. Straw, J. L. Kronenburg, C. F. McKnight, were nominated, and elected by acclamation.

After a short recess nominations for justices of the peace, constables and road supervisors of the several districts were made and ratified by the convention.

The central committee was elected, as follows: John Flanagan, J. T. Hall, A. J. Sherwood, J. W. Mast, Dr. K. A. Leep, D. J. Lowe, J. V. Foster.

The central committee was authorized to fill vacancies on the ticket.

Jefferson Memorial Road

Charlottesville, April 2:—Many delegates were present today at the opening of the good roads convention, for which preparations have been going forward for a number of weeks past. The primary purpose of the meeting is to inaugurate a movement for the construction of a two and one-half-mile road leading from this city to the home and tomb of Thomas Jefferson, at Monticello. The work is in the hands of a memorial road association, of which General Fitzhugh Lee is president, and aside from benefiting people desiring to visit Monticello, and as a unique memorial to the great statesman, the road is to serve as an object lesson in road construction.

GENERAL MILES WILL GO TO THE PHILIPPINES

Secretary Thinks Miles Hasn't Acted Nicely in the Past Year

Washington, Mar. 29—General Miles replying to the utterances of Roosevelt and Root frankly announces his intention of visiting the Philippines in the near future, whether or no, where as, he says: "I shall devote my attention to the conditions and requirements of the troops of that division, the same as I have with respect to the other portions of the army."

General Miles expresses regret that the secretary of war should be under the impression that his proposition, which was prompted in the interest of humanity, would be regarded as spectacular or sensational.

Root's comment on this is a caustic arrangement of Miles attitude during the past year. He states that Miles' original application to President McKinley for permission to go to the Philippines was accompanied by a proposal to obtain for Miles the supreme command of the allied forces in China, and that, under these circumstances, President McKinley declined to authorize the sending of Miles either to the Philippines or to China.

Root says that in the interest of good discipline and effective service, Miles' courses must be regretted.

While the President and Secretary of War still have a very intense feeling against the commanding general of the army on account of numerous things he has done, it is believed that wiser counsel will prevail. Both were informed that the senate would take it very ill, if Miles were punished for what he said before the Senate committee.
