NEW SHIP YARD FOR COOS BAY

K. V. Kruse, master ship builder, arrived on the Arcata from San Francisco. He will put in a shipyard just south of the stove mill and as soon as it is ready will commence the construction of a large four-masted schooner for Higgins & Collins, of San Francisco. FRED SCHETTER PASSES AWAY

Fred Schetter, one of Coos county's old settlers and most highly esteemed citizens, died at his home in Empire City at 7:50 o'clock Wednesday forenoon at the age of 71 years. He had been seriously ill for some weeks and had been gradually losing, so that a fatal termination was not unexpected.

Frederick Schetter was born in Baltimore, Maryland, Nov. 15, 1831. While still a young man he came to the Pacific coast and he resided in San Francisco for a number of years.

There he was married on Oct. 29, 1856 to Miss Emily G. Chase, who passed away in 1896. They came to Coos Bay in 1868 or 9 and Mr. Schetter had charge of the store at Eastport when that mine was running.

In 1870 he moved to Empire and when the Western Union telegraph line was put in, that year, he took the Empire City office, of which he has had charge ever since. He has also had general charge of the line from Roseburg, and for many years it was only the untiring efforts of Mr. Schetter that kept this section in telegraphic communication with the rest of the world. The line was not paying and the company would do nothing for its repair or maintenance, but Mr. Schetter, by means of subscriptions from the business men of the bay, and out of his own resources, managed to keep the line in workable order until it became self-supporting. He put in the first telegraph line to the Coquille, which gave that section communication until superseded by the phone.

For thirteen years Mr. Schetter acted as agent for the O. C. & N. Co. steamers, both at Empire City and Marshfield, and he conducted a general agency business in several lines. He also did considerable banking and exchange business before a bank was founded on the Bay. He also served two terms as county treasurer.

About four years ago he was seriously ill and his recovery was very slow and was not complete, so that his health has been precarious ever since. He then gave up business activity, with the exception of his supervision of the telegraph line, which he still managed with the assistance of his son Otto, who has charge of the Marshfield office.

Fred Schetter was a man of strict integrity, of a genial and accommodating disposition, and made many warm personal friends. He was a lover of nature, and used several years ago to find much pleasure in driving about the country with his span of horses and a light road wagon. After the death of his wife he resided with his daughter and son-in-law Mr. and Mrs. G. W. Getty, in Empire, and since his health failed he has spent considerable time visiting friends over the county, where the affectionate esteem in which he was held made him always welcome.

Four children survive him: Mrs. Julia Getty, of Empire City; E. W. Schetter, of Honolulu, H. I.; Mrs. Emma Williams and Otto Schetter, of Marshfield.

The funeral will take place at 3 p. m. Friday at Empire City, Rev. Wm. Horsfall conducting the services. The Flyer will go down in time for those who wish to attend.
