SERIOUSLY CUT.

J. L. Ferrey Jr. was cut in two places
Wednesday night at the Blanco hotel by
Wm. Herrow, commonly known as Billy
Gail. His wounds are not considered
dangerous.

The circumstances of the affair were
substantially as follows:

It seems that Gail had engaged a room
at the Blanco and had been shown its
location during the evening. A little
after midnight he went upstairs with a
companion and Ferrey, who was acting
as night clerk suspected that he was go-
ing to take the other to lodge with him,
and he went up to see about it. He
says that he found Gail at the end of the
hall, at the rear of the house, and asked
him what he was doing there. There
are varying stories, but a few moments
later, Emerson Ferrey, Lowery Owen
and Wm. Ferrey were on the scene,
young Ferrey had been cut in two
places, and Gail had been beaten up
considerably. Nightwatchman Twom-
bly took charge of Gail, placing him in
the city jail.

Dr. Tower and Dr. Straw were called
to attend young Ferrey, and dressed his
wounds. A gash in the front of the left
shoulder is quite large and deep. One
in the abdomen is smaller and is not
thought to have penetrated sufficiently
to be dangerous.

It seems that Gail had been drinking
and his story is that he was full and ask-
ed the young man who went up with
him to go and show him his room.

MORE PARTICULARS

Mortality Reports Still Coming in

NAMES OF SHIPS

LOST AT ST. PIERRE

Other Volcanos at Widely Separ-
ated Points Shown to be in
Sympathetic Agitation

London, May 14—Secretary Chamber-
lain last night received the following
telegram from the governor of the Wind-
ward islands, regarding the condition on
the island of St. Vincent, says: "I ar-
rived yesterday and found the state of
affairs much worse than given in the re-
ports forwarded by the administration.

"The country on the east coast at
Robin's Rock and Georgetown was appar-
ently struck and devastated in a manner
similar to St. Pierre. The fear is that
practically all living things were killed.

"The dead will probably reach 1600
but perhaps the exact number may
never be known.

"Managers and owners of estates and
their families, several of the better class
were killed. A thousand were found
burned and a hundred and sixty were
sent to the hospitals at Georgetown. Of
this number probably six will recover.
Details are too harrowing to describe.

"All the beet sugar estates in the
Caribe country are devastated and the
cattle dead.

"The eruption continues but it is ap-
parently moderating. Much anxiety is
still felt."

Paris, May 14—The Secretary of Mar-
tinique telegraphed from Fort de France

today: "I have ascertained positively
the names of the ships lost at St. Pierre
by the disaster. Seven is the number,
one French, two Italians, one English
and three American. The French ves-
sel is the Tamaya; the Italian, Nord
America Saraciro and Teresa Lrola;
English, cable ship Grappler; Ameri-
can, Rorsama, Arama and Anamore.

Castries, Island of St. Lucia, May 14—
The eruption of La Soufriere continues.
Great columns of smoke and balls of fire
are rising miles into the air. The dis-
charge is accompanied by tremendous
explosions which are heard miles away.
It is impossible to reach the burning
district which embraces the entire north-
ern end of the island. Kingston is safe,
though showers of ashes and pebbles
are continually falling.

Ponce, May 14—Mount Ione continues
to rumble and smoke, but fears of an
eruption have passed. A band of watch-
ers has been organized and constant
watch is being kept in order to give the
alarm in case of symptoms of an erup-
tion.

Advices from the south side of the
island are to the effect that heavy clouds
of smoke obscure the horizon. The sea
suddenly receded more than one hun-
dred feet this morning and the atmos-
phere is exceedingly oppressive.

Paris, May 14—A Naples dispatch
says that Vesuvius shows signs of activ-
ity. Lava is flowing from the crater on
the Pompeii side and hot cinders are
thrown out at intervals.
