RAIN TO SEE FURNISH

Governor Geer has Business at Roseburg Which Prevents his Presiding

Salem, Or., May 17-Hon. W. J. Furnish and other state candidates were greeted by monster demonstrations at Salem last evening.

The magnitude of the reception surpassed any demonstration of the kind ever witnessed in any political cam- Anthracite Men Expect to be paign. One thousand men participated in the procession from the Willamette hotel to the city hall, where 1500 people listened to an address by the future

The Armory was far too small to accommodate the immense throng, and hundreds were turned away.

The rain storm having abated for short time, about 2000 people collected in front of the city hall, where they were addressed by Frank Davey, candidate on the Republican legis'ative ticket. Mr. Davey gave a rousing patriotic talk, and held the crowd until Furnish arrived, when the scene which greeted his first appearance was re-enacted.

When the demonstration subsided, Mr. Furnish gave a short business talk, and impressed his bearers most favorably, as possessing the desired qualifica tions for chief executive of the state.

A drenching rain fell throughout the evening which by no means interrupted the enthusiasm of the crowd. The en tire demonstration was a memorable event in the political annals of Marion county.

The failure of Governor Geer to preside at the rally was an unexpected surprise and caused considerable comment, Governor Geer was wai ted upon Tuesday by W. J. Culver, chairman of the Marion county central committee, and accepted an invitation to serve as chairman of the meeting.

The governor left Thursday night for Roseburg announcing that he had gone on an official visit of inspection of the soldiers home. About noon Governor G-er, through his private secretary no ified Chairman Univer that he had been alled to Roseburg ou official business, but if possible, would return to Salem on the afternoon overland train. In case he should fail to return, he requested the committee to be prepared to prev de another chairman.




