RAILROAD RATES TO BE REDUCED

Portland, May 21—President Harrison announces that he will reduce the fare on all Oregon lines to three cents a mile, the new rates to go into effect soon.

Of Interest To Lumbermen

The English lumber trade is seriously contemplating accepting the American system of measuring lumber.

The Portland Bridge Co. has a contract for 18,000 piles. They go to Utah and will be used in a railway which crosses a lake. This is one of the largest pile contracts let on the Coast for some time.

A big sale of redwood timber is about to be consummated. The tract includes 35,000 acres, and the price is \$24 an acre, making a total of \$940,000. The purchase is made by Michigan men.

The great demand for sugar pine lumber, will certainly lead to a large influx of saw mills into northern California. At the present time the ability of the mills to supply the demand is markedly inadequate.

Profits in Honolulu must be good. A lumber company in that city has sued an Oregon mill company for \$105,000, claiming that would have been the profit if the mill company had shipped the stock. A claim of this kind should start a stampede for Honolulu instead of Nome.

After Timber Land.

There is a rush on to take up timber land along Catherine Creek, east of Union. For several months past timber cruisers representing Wisconsin and Minnesota lumbering interests have been examining the vast body of timber which begins about 10 miles east of Union and extends for a distance of 30 or 40 miles, and as a result almost every train now brings people from those states, who at once leave for the timber and make selections for filing. About 40 people have taken timber here during the past few weeks, and the movement has but commenced. A representative of a Wisconsin speculator said today that he was expecting 60 people here during the next few days to make locations in the Catherine section. One of the companies has already located a site on Catherine Creek for a big sawmill. There is a strong probability of a railroad being built from Union into this timber in the near future, and this rush is in anticipation of the construction of the road.
