"He found fault with Chamberlain, regarding his salary as district attorney of Multnomab county, but forgot to mention that he (Lee) is at present drawing his calary as superintendent of the penitentiary while he is out stumping the state for the Republicans."

J. D. Lee draws a salary from the state of \$1500 a year. He is absent on his trips but a few days at a time. absence makes a little more work for his warden and clerk, who are authorized to employ any extra help needed at his expense. When he returns to his post siter a short interval he cleans up all matters requiring his personal attention.

Chamberlain draws a salary from the state of \$4000 a year. He is devoting all of his time, from the start to the finish of the campaign, to advocating his own election, and if he has made any provisions to have his official duties adequately attended to the fact does not appear.


