Lake Steamers Collide

FOUL EACH OTHER

IN LAKE SUPERIOR

One Goes Down With Part of Crew--

Other Beached and Badly

Damaged.

Duluth, June 7.—A collision occurred in the harbor this morning between the steamer Wilson and the steamer Hadley, in which 17 of the former's crew lost their lives.

A great hole was stove in the Wilson's side and she sank almost immediately taking eight persons down with her.

Both vessels were valued at \$75,000. The Hadley was badly damaged, but managed to reach shore, where she was beached.

REORGANIZERS

NOT WANTED

Boiling Faction of New York Demo-

cracy Declares Strongly

Against David B. Hill

New York, June 7.—"No reorganizers" is the slogan of the Liberal Democrats who held a state convention in Cooper Union today to complete preparations for a vigorous campaign in New York State this fall. The addresses and the resolutions of the convention all pointed to avowed hostility to David Bennett Hill and all the other state leaders who were lukewarm in their support of Bryan in his two campaigns, or who openly opposed him. In an address to the public the organizers of the new party declare:

"The false leaders of the party in this state under David B. Hill were, prior to 1894, in absolute control of the government of this state, but accomplished nothing for the people and betrayed the confidence reposed in them. Having prostituted the party to a debased and degraded mercenary level, they used it simply as a means of granting favors to the few. David B. Hill as the leader of the party in the state led the party from a majority of 192,000 in 1882 to disgraceful defeat in 1894, when, as a candidate for Governor, the people of the state repudiated him and his leadership by 150,000 majority. These men again, under the leadership of Hill, now have the impudence and audacity to ask the confidence of the people."

Among well-informed politicians the

new movement is regarded as of more national than local significance. They believe it to be a well-laid plan of Mr. Bryan and his followers to eliminate Hill as a presidential candidate in 1904. Talk about the Democratic factions having agreed on Hill for a leader in the coming campaign is giving the Bryanites great concern. They calculate that Hill can be headed off as a presidential possibility by the nomination of a third state ticket this fall and the consequent defeat of the regular Democratic candidate for Governor. These views of the situation are strengthened by the fact that Norman E. Mack, New York member of the Democratic national committee, has been in the West conferring with the Nebraska leader. Mr. Bryan recently suggested the nomination of Mr. Mack for governor, and today's gathering of the element in revolt is believed to be the first step in an organized fight of the Bryanites to down Hill and defeat his hopes of being the standard bearer of the party in 1904.

San Francisco, June 7.—The steamer Palena arrived today from southern ports and brings news that the town of Retabulan, situated at the foot of Mt. Taconia in Guatemala, has been buried under a mass of lava, stone and ashes thrown from the volcano's crater. Probably 1000 people perished.

The volcano is 25 miles from Champanico, near the town of Tabacucalo, which is believed to have suffered severely.

The eruption occurred several days before the Palena arrived at Champanico. The vessel's officers were informed by the agents of the Pacific Steam Navigation Co. at that place that the volcano showed signs of the pending eruption several days previous to the outbreak. In fact, Mt. Taconia has been restless ever since the great earthquake of April 18th, which destroyed the city of Quetzaltenango.

For weeks a black cloud of thick smoke has hung over the summit, and the glare from the crater has frequently illuminated the skies.

Many inhabitants fled from their homes to places of safety and these escaped a frightful death.

When the eruption at last broke forth in full fury, showers of lava, ashes and stones entirely covered the country for miles around and the bay of Champanico was filled with a mass of floating pumice and ashes.

No details were obtainable by the officers of the Palena, but the loss of life is estimated at not less than 1000.

St. Lucia, June 7.—A submarine explosion today caused the sea to recede below its normal level.

Souffriere volcano on St. Vincent is quiet.

Fort DeFrance, June 7.—Yesterday's eruption of Mt. Pelee was far worse than the one previously suffered.

A severe earthquake was felt at Morne Rouge and a shower of stones fell five miles west into the sea. Stones also fell at Grand Anse on the east coast, and the town of Case Pilots, 4 miles from Fort DeFrance has been destroyed.
