Argument in Guden Case.
Albany, N. Y., June 9:—Argument was begun in the Court of Appeals today on the appeal of Charles H. Guden, the deposed Sheriff of Kings County. The appeal is from the decision of the Appellate Division reversing the judgement of Justice Gannor, declaring that Guden was not lawfully removed by Governor Odell, for possession of certain documents and papers belonging to the Sheriff of Kings County.
