AMNESTY DECLARED KILLED A REPORTER Fourth of July in Convict Tracy Sur- Philippines rounded Again

WAR ENDED AGAIN
BY PROCLAMATION
No Extra Session of Congress. Re-
ciprocity Treaty to be Prepared
In Vacation.

Washington, July 3.—A proclamation declaring the termination of hostilities in the Philippines and granting amnesty to all political offenders will be issued tomorrow over the signature of President Roosevelt.

Under the provisions of the proclamation, the office of military governor will be abolished.

Chaffee's position being in the department commanding, subject to call of the civil authorities.

The proclamation is President Roosevelt's contribution to the Fourth of July celebration. It will release from custody Aguinaldo, Pio del Pilar and Mabini.

Washington, July 3.—It may be authoritatively stated that the president will not call an extra session for the consideration of the Cuban Reciprocity treaty.

The Reciprocity Committee will prepare a commercial treaty, covering the points they are anxious to have enacted into law and will not present it until congress meets in regular session.

Steamer Service to Brazil.

New York, July 3.—The new steamship service between New York and North Brazil was inaugurated today with the sailing of the steamship Hungaria. The service is operated by the Hamburg-American company.

North Bend Items.

Another vessel will be commenced in the North Bend Shipyard at once. She will be a steam schooner of very light draught, about the size of the Mandalay, and is intended for the Coquille river trade. As soon as the model and specifications are received the keel will be laid and the boat pushed to completion.

On Monday of this week Mr. Simpson intended to commence running the mill night and day. It was found impossible, however, to get a crew together in time, and the matter was postponed for one week. LOCATED IN SEATTLE
PARK THIS TIME.
Makes it Warm for Newspaper Men
And Policemen—Will be Shot
On Sight.

Seattle, July 3.—Tracy, who held up four men and compelled them to run the launch Olympia, to Seattle yesterday evening was seen at six thirty this morning by a workman, named A. D. Freeman, walking on Seattle International Railway past Ravina park at the edge of the city. At a distance of 100 feet, Freeman recognized him from pictures. Tracy had a pack on his back and was carrying a rifle. Freeman ran to the nearest phone and told the police.

The entire sheriff's force and many police deputies were on the scene in thirty minutes.

They think Tracy is in Ravina Park, which is rough, and a heavy forest of brush. A battle is expected. The officers are trying to kill him on sight. Since the above was written, Tracy was located in the brush by two newspaper correspondents. Tracy killed one reporter and injured the other and killed or wounded two policemen.

Corbett and Sullivan.

St. Louis, Mo., July 3.—Unless the well laid plans of the West End Athletic club slip a cog at the eleventh hour "Young Corbett" and Dave Sullivan will battle twenty rounds in the arena of that organization tonight for the featherweight championship. The authorities have granted permission and Manager Haughton of the club expects no interference.

Logansport, Ind., July 3.—The ninth annual reunion of the Fifth regiment of Patriarchs Militant Order of Odd Fellows of Indiana opened today in Spencer Park on the banks of Eel River. One of the chief features of the three days' programme will be the competitive drills in which cannons from Indianapolis, Elwood and other cities of the state will take part.

Montana's New Capitol.

Helena Mont., July 3.—Tomorrow will be a red letter day for Montana and for Helena in particular. The new state capitol, which has been in progress of construction for the past three years, will be dedicated with imposing ceremonies. Delegations of visitors are arriving from all quarters of the state and the crowd promises to be the largest ever entertained in Helena. The attendance will be swelled by the presence of several thousand members of the Modern Woodmen who are to hold a big log-rolling. The other visitors include mayor and the other officials of the chief cities of the state, military organizations and other societies which are to assist in the ceremonies and take part in the big parade.

The dedicatory exercises are to be held in the afternoon and will be presided over by Governor Toole. United States Senators Clark and Gibson are to take part and the other speakers will include Secretary of State George M. Hays, former Governor Smith, ex-Senator Sanders and Chief Justice Theodore Brantley.

Ninety Miles Trolley Road.

New Orleans, La., July 3.—Governor Heard will officiate tomorrow at the breaking of ground for the New Orleans and Southwestern Railroad, the first interurban long-distance electric railroad in the South. It will be ninety miles long, running from New Orleans, through Baton Rouge, Venerie, Thibodaux, Houma and other towns of the sugar district to a place on the Gulf coast where there is eighteen feet of water.

Turned The Tables

WHITE CAPPERS GET
UP AGAINST IT
Leader Blown to Pieces With his
Own Dynamite after Whip-
ping a Woman

Union, Ark., July 3.—A gang of white caps whipped Mrs. Guist, a white woman, residing here Wednesday, and then placed dynamite under her house and blew it to atoms.

Harvey Sexton, a relative of the woman, whom the mob sought, led to the barn as the crowd approached and fired, the bullet striking a stick of dynamite in the vest pocket of Pink Gibson, the leader.

The explosion tore Gibson's body into a thousand pieces and scattered flesh and blood over trees and fences, severely wounding others of the white cappers.
