

FRANK ELROD DIES

SUDDENLY IN ALASKA

Heart Disease Carries off a Man Long and Favorably Known Here.

On Saturday morning the family of Frank Elrod received by letter the sad news of his death at St Michaels, Alaska, on July the 5th. Two letters were received, both written by Elmer Sanderlin. One was dated July 2nd and told of Mr. Elrod's serious illness, and the other dated July 10th gave an account of his death and burial. Unfortunately the first was delayed too long to perform its office of a warning, and the shock to the wife and family is very hard.

It seems that Mr. Elrod contracted some trouble of the lungs and heart in the mines at Dawson last winter and was obliged to go to a hospital at Dawson. He apparently recovered and was feeling unusually well until he started down the river, as pilot and master of the steamer Lovell Young, the finest of the Yukon river fleet. All the way down the river he was sick, and on arrival at St Michaels July 3d he was persuaded to see a doctor, who advised him to go to the hospital.

The doctor at the time told Mr. Elrod's friends that it was an incurable case of heart disease, although he might rally and live several years.

He went to the hospital on the 3rd, where he had the best of care. His friends Elmer Sanderlin, Capt. Robert Fredericks, and Mr. Livingston, formerly of Zandon were with him, also the officers and managers of the steamboat line and every possible care and attention was given him, but without avail. The funeral occurred on the 10th, under the auspices of the Masons and Odd Fellows, to both of which orders he belonged, and all that was mortal of Frank Elrod rests on a hillside overlooking the ocean.

Deceased, whose full name was William Francis Elrod, was born on Prince Edwards Island, Aug. 25th 1847. When he was three years old his parents moved to Iowa, where he grew to manhood, serving in an Iowa regiment during the civil war.

He came to Coos Bay about 1875. He worked first for H. P. Whitney in the butchering business. Afterwards he worked in the woods and as a raftman and later was steamboating for a number of years. He served as marshal of this town for about four years.

Concluding to try his fortune in the North, he left here on Feb. 17, 1898, and has been in Alaska ever since, having been steamboating on the Yukon when the river was open. He had risen to the position of master and pilot on the finest boat on the river, and intended to visit his home here this Fall.

Besides the widow, whose maiden name was Mary J. Maddin, to whom he was married in Marshfield on Dec. 22, 1878, three daughters and one son survive him, viz: Mrs. Etta Sacchi Mieses Frances and Stella and Master Iris Elrod, all of this place.

He was a Mason, an Odd Fellow and a member of the A. O. U. W., in which he carried \$2000 insurance.

Frank Elrod was a man whom every one liked and respected; who would take his place as a man among men in any locality and under any circumstances.

His acquaintance in this section was very wide, and all will regret his untimely death, and sympathize with the bereaved family.
