SUMMARY OF THE WEEK'S DISPATCHES

Sunday's Daily

Cholera outbreak at Manila. Earthquake shocks are frequent at Madrid. Anti-friar demonstration are on foot at Manila. A violent epidemic of cholera is threatening Upper Egypt. English cabinet officers anxious over King's condition. Typhoid and yellow fever are raging at Valencia, Venezuela. Germany has adopted a customs tariff on imported silver. The governor of Panama is willing to accept peace proposals. Rehearsals for the coronation procession are going on in London. Terrific submarine eruptions occurred at Azores Islands. President Loubet ordered the closing of the Catholic schools of France. Business is paralyzed in Venezuela, owing to the revolution in progress there. Dr. Zallia, the Palestine explorer has unearthed the remains of King Solomon's Temple in Samaria. A severe typhoon is sweeping over the Island of Luzon, between the 13th and 18th parallels. China will abolish Likin throughout the empire thus securing free transit of merchandise native and foreign. Ed Marten, the American pugilist, won the colored championship of the world from Bob Armstrong in London today.

A meeting of the Privy Council was held today aboard the King's yacht with a view to proclaiming August 9th a holiday.

Tuesday's Daily

Belgium has obtained from China a concession of 309 acres of land north of Tian Tsen. King Edward's condition continues to improve, the wound healing satisfactorily. China sends an imperial commissioner to represent her interest at the St. Louis exposition. Plans for the organization of a college at Manila for the training of Filipino teachers are being perfected. Orders have been issued for an imposing British naval review to take place August 18th off Spithead. Jaiameans talk of annexation to the United States. The United States cruiser San Francisco has arrived at Havre. Volcanic disturbances are threatening Coeta Rica. French peasants protest against the closing of Catholic schools. Russia says she is justified in meeting the American advance in duties on sugar.

Wednesdays Daily

A new pottery is to be established in Portland. The religious agitation in France is abating. The trouble in the Servian cabinet has been patched up. German government has adopted the tariff on pig iron. The battleship Illinois is in dry dock at Chatham, England. Transport Buford sailed from Manila for the United States. Cardinal Golliben appointed successor of the late Cardinal Ledochowski. Report comes from London that Rockefeller and Rothschild have formed an oil combine. General Lucas Meyer, former commander of the Orange Free State forces, is being lionized in London.

The Boer generals, Dewet, Botha and a clergy were recipients of an enthusiastic ovation at Cape Town. The president of Peru urges immediate action to combat the existing abuse of the use of alcohol in his country.

Friday's Daily.

A number of anarchists have been arrested at Rome. The Queen of Spain has left Madrid for Vienna. King Edward will review the colonial troops Aug. 11th. Lord Pauncefote's will was proved today. It leaves 64,000 pounds. Fatalities among tourists in the Austrian alps have been frequent of late. Lord Kitchner has been presented with a sword of honor, the gift of Cape Town. Secy. Root arrived at Havre and was officially greeted by the French consul. Col. Arthur Lynch, the Irish member of parliament charged with treason has been committed for trial. Cayacebo, a dangerous gusrjilla chieftain, operating in Lima province, has surrendered to the United States government. A grant of 250,000 pounds for the relief of the sugar planters of the British West Indies has been made by the House of Commons. Cholera is violently epidemic in Manchura. Hundreds of victims, mostly Chinese but including Russians and other Europeans, are dying daily. In a riot among planters in Manenburg, Dutch Guinea, 13 persons were killed and 40 injured.
