Oil producers of Russia are preparing to fight the oil trust.

Vatican proposes the gradual withdrawal of the friars from the Philippines.

King Edward will grant the Boer generals an audience upon their arrival in London.

A secret organization of bandits in Tayas has been discovered.

Members of the labor party have been elected to the English House of Commons without opposition.

Firmin's army has been reorganized, and is marching on to Port Daudaux-prince.

Cholera is on the increase in the province of Manilla.

The war in Hayti is well under the control of the national forces.
