Cream of the Week's News.

Wilkesbarre, Pen., Aug. 19—Every preparation for the resumption of work in the Warnak washery, at Duryea, tomorrow is being made. Forty men arrived this morning. Steam was gotten up and trouble is feared as shown by the active steps being made to meet any move on the part of the strikers calculated to prevent the opening of the works.

Additional arms have been procured and the force of coal and iron police have been increased.

Toledo, Aug. 19—The Canadian government has instructed their agent here to proceed to the anthracite coal region to offer inducements to the 30,000 or more strikers' families to form a colony and settle on Canadian land which would be donated by that government. Work will be provided for the men until they have prepared land for crops.

Madrid, Aug. 22—King continues to give the official dignitaries and nobility palpitation of the heart by this recent conduct. His latest action has caused consternation. His positive refusal to marry a European Princess, he announces his intention of marrying the daughter of a South American millionaire who proposes mending the state finances thus reconciling the Republican element by taking a plebeian wife and restoring Spanish prestige in Latin America.

Havana, Aug. 22—Serious aspect in the situation incident to dock laborers and carters is increasing. The continuance of the strike has paralyzed business, both foreign and local and no solution is in sight.

New York, Aug. 22—Practically no

move so far as the public knows has been made to end the coal strike. The belief is prevalent that the almost weekly increase in the retail price of coal demands of the public measures for adjustment of the difficulties by arbitration.
