## GREAT CENTRAL RAILROAD ACTIVITIES

Prominent Contractors and Capitalists Looking Over the Situation Here and Well Pleased

During the past week many strangers have visited the city and among them the railroad capitalist and contractors have been largely in evidence. Nelson Bennett, capitalist and well known railroad contractor, left yesterday morning after having looked over the situation. He is expected to be largely identified in the construction of the Great Central railroad. He made an examination of the harbor, going out over the bar in a tugboat and also inspected the properties secured by the company for terminals and went over the Belt Line route with the view of familiarizing himself with the situation and all conditions. He expressed himself as highly delighted with the situation.

The advantages and excellence of the harbor were a revelation to him. The ease with which ships arrive and depart through the entrance interested him greatly. However, he was non-committal as to detail of plans of the company, but that big development in the affairs of the Great Central railroad are near at hand is the conviction of all closely observant of the moves being made by those supposed to have inside information.

W. S. Small, formerly of Small Bros., former Northern-Pacific railroad contractor, is now located here with his family. He has the contract for clearing and grading the Belt Line road ready for track laying. He is pushing the work energetically.

The Great Central Land company is rapidly getting the Bangor townsite in condition for the erection of buildings. A large force of men are employed in clearing preparatory to grading the streets. The first two buildings to go up will be a \$25,000 hotel and an office building to cost a like amount, both buildings to be erected by the company. The site for the hotel is now being graded.

Cleveland, O., Sept. 9.—Considerable interest attaches to the annual meeting of the Ohio Liquor League, which opened in Cleveland today, for the reason that an effort is to be made to amalgamate all the liquor organizations in Ohio in order to strengthen their political influence. Among the organizations it is proposed to unite are the Knights of Fidelity, the Royal Arch and the Independent Royal Arch.

Newport, R. I., Sept. 9.—The autocrats of the canine kingdom had things pretty much their own way at the Casino today. The shows of the Rhode Island Kennel Club are always well worth witnessing, but the present one is more interesting than any of the previous ones, the exhibits including the pets of all the wealthy Newport cottagers. Among the winners were distributed this afternoon the trophies offered by the Ladies' Kennel Association of America and other organizations of dog fanciers.

# Confers With Morgan

PENNSYLVANIA GOVERNOR WORKING FOR SETTLEMENT

Coal Operators Willing to Concede Ten Per Cent Advance in Wages

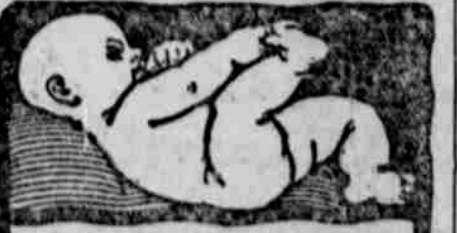
New York, Sept 9—Gov. Stone of Pennsylvania arrived this morning and went to the office of the United Steel Corporation.

Stone is in conference with Morgan and his partners Steel and Perkins, and President Baer and other coal operators are holding a session believed to be in touch with the Stone conference. It is reported in Wall street that the operators are willing to give the miners ten per cent increase in wages but refuse to treat with Mitchell or representatives of the United Mine Workers.

Gov. Stone gave out the following: "Attorney General Elkins, Senator Flynn and myself have been in conference several hours with Wisner director of the Steel Corporation, representing Morgan, who is anxious to have the anthracite strike settled."

Stone refused to say what progress had been made. Morgan is known to have been in conversation with Stone for some time.

New Orleans, La., Sept. 9—One of the most serious questions with which the planters of the Delta are face to face is the scarcity of labor for gathering the cotton crop. The yield promises to be unusually large this season in the Delta, with the possible exception of lower Mississippi, and yet there has never been a time when labor was so scarce or unreliable.
