### Heavy Lumber Shipments

Lumber shipments by water from the Columbia River will this year, for the first time on record, exceed 100,000,000 feet. This enormous total is already assured by the actual shipments made for the first nine months of the year, and the tonnage engagements which are to be filled prior to December 31. The shipments for the past nine months have amounted to over 74,000,000 feet, of which 43,814,000 feet were sent coastwise and 30,285,000 feet foreign.
