### SCOTT'S BOAT FOUND

#### MALICIOUSLY DAMAGED

Peter Scott, whose fishing boat and net were stolen Wednesday, found the boat yesterday. It lay in the first little slough branching off from Coalbank slough, above the first point from the coal bunker. The boat was empty and had been practically destroyed by punching over a dozen holes in her bottom and sides. This had evidently been done with a steel bolt-set which Mr. Scott had left lying in the boat. The oars, rowlocks and net had disappeared. The rope with which the net

was fastened to the thwart had been cut although it could easily have been untied. It is hard to understand the malicious vandalism of such a senseless destruction of property, and it is to be hoped that the act will furnish a clue to the perpetrator of the theft and outrage.

So far, Mr. Scott has obtained no definite trace to lead to the recovery of his net. The loss falls heavily upon him at this time. Not only is he out \$250 worth of property, but he is prevented from fishing for the balance of the season, as it would not pay to fit up for the short time remaining.

### STATE AND GENERAL NEWS.

Last Monday afternoon at Roseburg Thomas H. Lovell was found guilty of manslaughter. He was charged with the murder of H. L. Rodman, near Wilbur, Douglas Co. last July. He received a sentence to the penitentiary for a term of 7 years. A motion for a new trial was overruled.

Taylor Beckley, a brakeman on the S. P. road met death Monday at Roseburg. All four wheels of the tender and one of the drive wheels of the engine passed over his body and strange to say the skin on his body was not even scratched. His spine was broken.

By recent surveys made in North-eastern Oregon the line is several miles farther over and extends to where Idaho has been supposed to be. Oregon is richer by several miles.

The population of Eugene is said to be 5500.

The Monmouth and Independence bands have consolidated.

J. F. Markley has begun a life sentence in the Oregon Penitentiary. He lived a quiet peaceful citizen in Marion County for 35 years. His ungovernable temper brought him where he is. He was a law-abiding citizen and a good man and deserved a better fate but his

inability to control his temper put him where he is.

Two irrigation Companies have secured contracts from the State for the reclamation of arid land in the upper Deschutes country. The contracts are secured under the Carey Arid land Act. One company has a contract to reclaim 84,707 acres. The other one 68,091 acres.

Grading on the Dallas and Falls city railroad has begun and the work is being pushed.

Arthur Schofield an escaped prisoner from the Linn county jail was recaptured at Eugene.

Marion county Physicians have organized a county Medical Society.

The great Horse cannery, known as Lintons Horse-Pickling works has been burned. Loss \$15,000. The cannery may be rebuilt.
