TWENTY WORKING MAJORITY FOR THE REPUBLICAN

Babcock Makes strongest Claim For New York—Cable Thinks Loud Defeated in Calif.

New York, Nov. 1.—Chairman Babcock of the Republican congressional committee said this afternoon that the Republicans will have twenty working majority in the next congress. He regards that as a minimum estimate and expects the Central West and Rocky Mountain districts and the Pacific Coast states to go Republican.

He says Odell for governor of New York will be elected by 40,000 majority, and he expects a sweeping victory in the anthracite regions.

Chicago, Nov. 1.—Benj. Cable, of the Democratic congressional committee today issued a statement in which he says that while he was not sanguine of overwhelming majorities he believed the party will have a working majority of at least twenty congressmen. He predicts the winning of New York on a small margin.

The states in which the greatest Republican success is expected are Idaho, Wyoming, Montana, Utah, Washington, Vermont, West Virginia, Maine, Minnesota, New Hampshire and North Dakota. Cable believes that Congressman Loud will be defeated in California.

Evans Relieves Rodgers

Yokohama, Nov. 1.—Pursuant to orders from the Navy department at Washington Rear, Admiral Robley D. Evans to-day took over the command

of the American Asiatic squadron. Admiral Evans relieves Admiral Frederick Rodgers, who returns home on the cruiser New York.

Wilkesbarre, Nov. 1.—The Arbitration Commission arrived from Scranton at an early hour this morning in a seemingly aggressive mood. They were met by a number of prominent railway officers who would endeavor to show them courtesy.

They were given to understand by the operators that in this region, filled with shafts, where coal was mined on a very small margin, if an increase of wages were made many contractors will have to go out of business.

Although the depot is in sight of Mitchell's headquarters, neither Mitchell nor his associates came out to greet the commissioners.

Watkins has issued an order for the commission, announcing that in future none but members of the local press and representatives of the press associations will be allowed to accompany the commissioners on underground trips. A large number of special correspondents for the big dailies were disappointed, but they were compelled to remain away from the investigation party.

Scranton, Nov. 1.—The Commission will return here this evening to remain over Sunday. Bishop Spaulding will celebrate mass at St. Peter's cathedral tomorrow morning, and the board has been given a special invitation to attend Sunday night.

Early Monday morning the commission leaves for Hazleton to spend several days looking over the mines there.

Sharon, Pa., Nov. 1.—A wage advance of 10 cents a day went into effect to-day at the mines of the Powers Coal Company, a few miles west of here. About 100 men are affected. The advance was made voluntarily.

Washington, D. C., Nov. 1.—Gen. Corbin to-day resumed his duties at the War Department, relieving Brig.
