TO FREEZE AND SHIP

STEELHEAD SALMON

The Coos Bay Ice and Cold storage Co. has contracted with the Pacific cold storage Co. of Tacoma for the delivery of frozen steel-head salmon, in quantities up to 250 tons. The fish will be obtained from the Umpqua, the Coquille and Coos river, and will be shipped in a frozen state to San Francisco and Portland. From those points they will be sent east and will eventually find their way into the European market. The taking of fish is expected to commence about Dec. 15th, and it is expected that about 200 tons will be secured.

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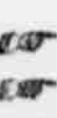
