School Board Holds Meeting

The school board held a meeting Monday evening at the office of the school clerk, John F. Hall. The report of the teachers for the school term ending June 6th, was received and approved, and the teachers' salaries were ordered paid.

The clerk was ordered to post notices warning the public not to trespass on the school property.
