ANOTHER STEAMER FOR COOS BAY

To Be Built At The Kruse Ship Yard For San Francisco Trade

It seems likely at this time that the next vessel to be built at the Kruse shipyard will be a fine passenger and freight steamer to ply between this port and San Francisco. It is proposed that the boat shall be built by San Francisco and Coos Bay capital, a good proportion of the stock to be owned on the Bay. It is now stated on the authority of Capt. Colstrup that arrangements are practically completed, and the steamer will be constructed and placed on the route. She will have a carrying capacity of about 300,000 feet of lumber, besides miscellaneous freight. She will also have accommodations for about 30 first-class passengers.

There will be plenty of business for a boat of this kind, and in the line of passengers travel she is badly needed. That she is to be constructed on the Bay is a matter of congratulation and will give the people here a feeling of interest in her.

TRAGIC DEATH

Falls Overboard From the Arcata off Coos Bay Bar,

No one witnessed the tragedy and the circumstance can only be surmised. Mr. Dean occupied a stateroom with C. Dillman, his brother-in-law. He had been confined to his berth except a short time spent on deck Monday afternoon. Mr. Dillman had been awake nearly all night, and about 5 a. m. he dropped asleep for a short time. When he awoke, Mr. Dean was gone. Search was at once instituted but without avail, and there is no question but the unfortunate man met his death as indicated.
