## POPE LEO IS DEAD

Passed Away at 4:10 p.m. Today

The United States has received a cardinal Gibbons, at Rome, saying "The Pope died at 4:10 p.m., July 20."

The following dispatch was sent to Cardinal Rampolla at Rome by President Roosevelt's order at 1:15 this afternoon:

"The President desires me to express the profound sense of loss Christian world sustains in

to believe the Pope's dissolution is near at hand.

12:40 p.m. the Cardinals of Rome have been summoned to the Vatican which is a very strong indication that the end is approaching. Cardinal Serafino Vannicelli, Grand Penitentiary, entered the papal chamber for the purpose of giving His Holiness absolution in articulo mortis.

The Holy sacrament was exposed at St. Peter's Basilica this morning as a sign that the final agony had commenced.

An official bulletin by the physicians, very laconic, reads: "Last night His Holiness slept only at short intervals. His general condition remains constantly grave. Pulse 94, respiration 32, temperature 36.2 centigrades."

At 1 p.m. the following semi-official medical statement was made: Vatican — The Pope is in a state of fever, which even the physicians are unable to define scientifically.

London, July 20.—The claims of the Catholic Church are so lofty, its organization so peculiar, there being no other ecclesiastical monarchy in Christendom and its history has been so splendid, that the approaching election to the throne cannot be otherwise than a subject of intense intellectual interest throughout the world. This is especially at the present vacancy, as it stands at the moment, the successor

majority to the concilium composed of Italian-born, but there are grave reasons, almost overwhelming reasons, why no one out of that nation should be selected.

The old reason that the Church is centralized in Rome, and that the Congregations or Committees which govern it, would feel themselves out of touch with a foreign Pope, is still operative and rather stronger than weaker because the new Dogma has compelled them all to exalt their chief's spiritual rights. International enmities have become more bitter; and no German or Englishman could be elected because Frenchmen and Spaniards would believe him hostile, while the choice of a Frenchman would raise suspicion in all who think in German or possibly in Magyar.

The death of Cardinal Ledochowski has left but one Slav Cardinal—Missis—who might be included among the papabili, and though he would be a worthy candidate, he would be disliked both in Russia and Germany, as sure to keep up the sentiment, partly religious and partly national, which prevents Poles from being politically forgotten. An American Cardinal might no doubt be elected without exciting much international feeling—though Spanish America, if it must be remembered, is a great division of the Catholic world, and both Argentina and Brazil the North American, but the election of Cardinal Gibbons would seem to the congregations a revolutionary proceeding, and one, moreover, likely to bring about the grand obstacles of all, a fatal to the last chance of realization of the temporal power, too, if accomplished at all,

lashed by the sword, and the imposition by force of a sovereign rejected by a people is painfully repugnant. Private Cardinals cannot be induced to surrender all hope of becoming Princeps, and the world how a state ought to be formed for the promotion of Christian life, and they certainly will not add to the difficulties in the way of their dream by selecting as their successor

Probably the best game of ball that was ever witnessed in Coos County was pulled off in the Marshfield ball park Sunday, between Marshfield and Bandon, Bandon coming out ahead by five hard earned scores. The attendance was very large and the crowd was enthusiastic, and while the Marshfield rosters were naturally in a large majority, there was no lack of open appreciation of Bandon's good work. The game was not marred by any unseemly wrangling but good feeling prevailed throughout. The decision of the umpire was accepted with good grace by both sides, and seemed to give satisfaction all around.

The ground was in fine condition and the weather was good for the game, being cloudy enough so that a high sky could be seen from any direction.

The usual protest was issued by Bodillion, the protest filed, but the game was not marred by that, and started after a few minutes' rag chewing. The home team had been strengthened by three new players, and they certainly did credit to Marshfield. Arrellanes as pitcher did excellent work, and though Bandon

got a few scattering hits off him we think that he will show them up the next time. Nealon as catcher was errorless and cannot be beat when it comes to catching and his throwing to second is above reproach. Strub as center fielder, another new man, did some grand stands in the garden, besides some good throws to several of the bases. Ferrey as right fielder was another man with the goods and landed several good brick catches off from Bandon, besides tapping some good ones for the Bandon fielders; he also made a good run for second but was thrown out by one of the Bandon fielders. He received several ovations from the grand stand.

In fact, up to the eighth inning it was nobody's game, and it was plainly apparent that there must be a breakdown or a piece of bad luck come wherefore a score could be made. Unfortunately for Marshfield's ambition, the break came on our side, and Bandon got in two runs in the eighth and a little better in the ninth.

There is no blinking the fact that the Bandon team is a hard combination to go up against, and if Marshfield gets a game from them it will take perfect work to do it. If other changes are found to be necessary in the Marshfield team, it is to be hoped that the management will have no hesitation in making them.
