## HELD WITHOUT BAIL

Another Beaver Hill Row Results Seriously

About half an hour later, while Davidson was sitting by a pile of mine logging Abbo slipped up behind him and hit him three times with a large club, fracturing his skull at the base. Davidson's condition is very critical and his injuries are likely to prove fatal.

Her capacity is to be from 450 to 600 thousand feet. She will burn crude oil from the Southern California oil wells and will have compartments for storing that fuel in her bottom; thus the fuel will serve the purpose of ballast on her up trips. The oil compartments are to be so arranged as to be filled with water as the oil is used thus keeping the "net of ballast" complete. This schooner is to be second to none as far as strength and equipment are concerned and the latest marine machinery will drive her at the rate of about ten knots per hour. Captain Hamilton, who was for many years the master of the steamer "Pasadena," will be master. The Gardiner Mill Company is to be congratulated on their enterprise and progress. It will be only a matter of time when at least the smaller class of sailing vessels will give way to steam schooners. The question of carrying capacity has been solved to a great extent and the saving of time and many extra trips a year will more than pay the expense of machinery, fuel and skilled labor. The Umpqua harbor will no doubt some day—possibly not far distant—figure as the front door for this part of Oregon.
