The potato situation remains very much the same in the San Francisco market. receipts were somewhat lighter, with the market badly overstocked with River Burbanks. Fancy Salinas stock is well held at the top quotation.

Butter is very much depressed, with the ordinary grades of creamery stock selling at from 24 to 26 cents.

There seems to be a great scarcity of fresh eggs all along the coast, in fact it is next to impossible to get them. Locally, there are no fresh eggs coming in at all.

The market in Frisco is rapidly filling up with fancy apples from Oregon and Colorado. The price has not declined any.

Potatoes and apples are in ample supply in Marshfield.

There is some talk of shipping Eastern butter in, which would leave an elegant margin at the price now being asked. There is no doubt before the season is over considerable will have to be imported to supply the trade. This will have a tendency to make butter much cheaper than it has heretofore been in midwinter.
