

NAN PATTERSON'S TRIAL BEGINS

tions were resumed. Two attempts were made to get the girl to leave Young, but she declined, stating he had to undergo an operation. Young then decided to go to Europe.

They were to leave June 4th. June 3rd a tall athletic young man, smooth shaven, accompanied by a young woman, entered a shop on 516 6th avenue and purchased a revolver, the only one of that number in the world. J. Morgan Smith, brother-in-law of Nan Patterson, answered the description. The prosecutor then gave a detailed account of the meetings of Young and Miss Patterson that evening and the following morning, leading up to the time of the shooting in the cab.

After the shooting the revolver was found in Young's right coat pocket. The autopsy developed that Young was shot transversely across the body, and the police came to the conclusion that murder was committed.

He told of several meetings on the previous day and the girl's refusal to allow Young to go to Europe. Also of the disappearance of NTAJ. Morgan Smith and his wife after the discovery of the place where the revolver was purchased.

He concluded at 12:40 and a recess was taken until two.

New York Nov. 22.—Nan Patterson passed a sleepless, restless night in the Tombs. The scathing argument of the prosecutor and the sight of her lover's garments with the bullet hole and stained with his blood had been too much for her nerves and she collapsed when she returned to her cell. The reaction over, Miss Patterson calmed herself and said: "The first day is over, and I find nothing to hurt me."

Her face was pale and bloodless and looked almost chalky against the setting of her black dress and veil as she came into court this morning and sat by her father's side.

Miss Patterson was much perturbed by the gaze of the curious crowd of the court room today. When she reached

her seat she turned and grasped her father's hand.

Sergeant Norris of Leonard street station where the defendant was brought when arrested, was the first witness today. He identified the revolver which the policeman handed to him when he brought Miss Patterson in. It contained three loaded shells, one exploded shell and one empty cylinder.

Captain Sweeney identified the revolver said to have been taken with the defendant to the station after the shooting. She said Young shot himself. The first she knew of it was when she heard a muffled shot and her companion fell over in her lap. She said they had been quarrelling in the cab.

Frederick Michaels, the cabman, identified the photographs of the cab. He testified that the cab was engaged by a man and woman at 59th Broadway; he recognized the defendant but could not identify Young from his photograph. They drove to Fifth avenue where the man bought a hat, they then drove to West Broadway where a few minutes later came out and drove south again. Neither one was under the influence of liquor. After they had crossed Canal street on West Broadway he heard a pistol shot, the horse plunged forward and he stopped after a block and a half. The defendant asked him to drive to the store. He did not look inside to see what had happened. He heard no quarrelling. He saw the man carried into the hospital but again failed to recognize a photo.

Frederick Waldens, bartender at the Bleeker, West Broadway, and 4th Tenny, druggist, were called but their testimony threw no light on the tragedy. Recess.

The first witnesses this afternoon were Wm. Steen Jr., a truckman, who heard the shot fired, saw the smoke coming from the cab, followed the cab to drug store, and saw defendant seated in cab with a man's head in her lap. Her hands were hanging down, he did not see a weapon in either hand.

Potatoes are showing a decided improvement in San Francisco, especially for the better grades. A fair shipping demand is developing and if this continues stock will be materially reduced.

There has been a marked falling off in the receipts of apples, but the supply on hand is more than ample and as a result there has been no improvement in prices.

Butter still continues to decline with no sign of a stop as the receipts are running far in excess of the sales.

Cheese is also declining. Locally there are quite a number of growers who are anxious to dispose of their apples, but the San Francisco market not being in good condition makes the buyers very cautious in their movements, in fact two of them have withdrawn from the field in this territory entirely.

Something will have to be done to relieve the supplies of chickens in this territory. While there has been no change in the retailers price, still, at the same time, in a wholesale way the retailers can buy at their own price.

The important point in potatoes in San Francisco, doubt, will soon start shipments from here.
