Minister Will Leave
Rev. H. T. Murray has withdrawn
from the pastorate of the Presbyterian
church and will leave about the first
of January for Fresno, Cal., where he
has accepted a call to the Belmont ave-
nue church of that city.

Tatman's Body Found

The body of Walter Tatman, who
fell from the launch Owl and was
drowned, was found today floating in
the bay opposite the Standard Oil Co.'s
warehouse.
Wm. Chapman, engineer of the Cold
Storage plant, was the first to discover
the body and assistance being pro-
cured, rowed out to the body (and
towed it to the wharf where it was
tied until Coroner Mingus could be
located, which was done at once; Dr.
Mingus, in company with Undertaker
Lewis, went to the scene and brought
the remains to Johnson's undertaking
parlors. The body could only be iden-
tified by the clothing as the features
are entirely unrecognizable, the flesh
being entirely stripped from the head
and face by the voracious crabs, while
the body was lying in the bottom of
the bay.
It is thought that the body had just
risen, the cold weather that has pre-
vailed since the time of the drowning
having prevented it from doing so
sooner.
Fred Brendle, of North Bend, for
whom the unfortunate young man
formerly tended bar, was notified and
he, in company with several friends,
came to Marshfield and took charge
of the body. Mr. Brendle stated that all
efforts to find any relatives of the dead
man have been futile and that at the
time of his death he was possessed of
but \$2.20. The funeral expenses will
be borne by a number of his former
friends and associates.
An inquest was held at 2 o'clock
this afternoon in the undertaking
parlors and it was found that the deceased
met his death by accidental drowning
on Friday, Nov. 26, 1904.
