COLOR PHOTOGRAPHY

ACHIEVED AT LAST

Eastern Oregon Photographer Hits Upon Method of Reproducing Natural Tints.

The Oregonian says that Professor A. B. Leckenby, United States agrostologist at Union, Or., has discovered a method of producing a photographic likeness of any object with all the natural colors of that object standing out in the print.

This long has been the goal of photographers and scientists, and some progress had been made in that direction.

Dr. Lockenby's discovery is all in the result of an accident. While working in his laboratory he was either struck with the new idea which makes color photography possible or he accidentally ran across his new compound. He quickly put his idea into shape, and with the result that he has several photographs of flowers, and all beautiful in their natural hues.

As far as it is possible to ascertain at the present time, the new method is the same as the old system of photography up till the act of making the print. The plate used is a Craemer isochromatic, such as are in use every day by enthusiasts. The difference lies in the emulsion on the sensitive paper. The slight differences in the shades on the negative plate are just enough to act in different ways on the paper during printing and produce the several colors, and after the toning and fixing operations, which are also probably unlike those in present use, the picture comes out resplendent in colors instead of all the same slate or sepia tone.

Up to the present time only one fault has been found with the pictures. They are not all the same shade. A red rose may show pink at one time, and with the next tone and fixing a dark crimson. In either case the color will still be red, but the shades will be decidedly different. Even this objection, which is not in itself very serious, Dr. Leckenby thinks, will be remedied, and while coming to Portland on the train he thought out a method which will have the effect of bringing the various prints to a more even tone.

It is generally understood that Professor Leckenby will not patent his discovery or try to make money from it, but he will give it to the world. He is, however, taking steps to procure for himself the honor of having discovered the new method and to prevent any one else from using it as a money-making scheme. It has not been generally published that the discovery has been made, but those who have seen the prints have accepted it as a fact, as Professor Leckenby is not a person to give out false statements about such matters.

Salt Lake-Los Angeles

Chicago, Nov. 29.—Senator Thomas Kearns, of Utah, and Richard C. Kerns of St. Louis, have held a conference here on matters connected with the San Pedro Los Angeles & Salt Lake Railroad. They said that all the contests and legal obstacles regarding the right of way had been disposed of, and that the road would be completed as rapidly as men and money could do the work.

"We have completed 112 miles in Southern California," said Mr. Kerns "and construction is progressing on the remaining 350 miles from Salt Lake. That part of the now built connects with the Santa Fe at Redlands, Cal., and our trains will run over the Santa Fe track

to a point in Arizona, where we will have another junction for the lines from the North.

"In Utah the arrangements are to acquire by lease or purchase what is known as the Oregon Short Line and thus get an independent entrance to Salt Lake City. It is understood by all the parties interested that no parallel lines shall be constructed in that region."

Both Senator Kearns and Mr. Kerns declared that the new harbor and terminals at San Pedro would be as fine as any on this continent.

PACIFIC MONTHLY

The December number of the Pacific Monthly, which will be issued about the 25th of November, is a fine example of the brilliant progress which has been made by the magazine throughout the year. It is a Christmas number in the best sense of the phrase, and no finer holiday edition has ever been issued by any periodical published on the Pacific Coast. Within its bright covers is a feast of interest to all lovers of magazine literature. It shows a considerable increase in the number of pages and a prodigality of illustrations that is very acceptable.

The opening article is a fascinating write-up of the Passion-Play, presented annually by the Indians of British Columbia, under the direction of the Catholic priests. It is not generally known that within the confines of our own continent there is being produced every year a Passion-play which, in dramatic effectiveness, rivals the Oberammergau production, but such is the fact. The article is profusely illustrated by photographs of most of the principal tableaux and participants, which add much to its interest.

"A New Type of Battleship," illustrated by photographs, is descriptive of the new vessels which are to make the United States navy the greatest in the world.

"A Famous Trick Horse" tells of an educated horse owned by Robert Lowry, of Aberdeen, Wash. The accompanying photographs are inimitable.

"The Combined Harvester and Thresher" illustrates the methods employed in reaping and threshing the tremendous wheat crops of the Northwest.

The two short stories are both Western stories; both are appropriate to the Christmas tide; and both are prettily illustrated. One, "As it Seemed in Soundough's Cabin," is a captivating tale of the experiences of three miners on a Christmas Eve in the Klondike, written by Mr. McInnes, of Vancouver, B. C. The other, "The Sending Forth of Little Jane," relates the trials and final triumph of a "Sky-Pilot" and a little waif whom he adopted.

To those who are acquainted with the Pacific Monthly, the departments are the most acceptable feature of the magazine. Eight in number, they cover a wide range of interest. From "Our Point of View" to "Dial," each one is brimful of bright, readable matter, giving evidence of painstaking preparation. "Questions of the Day," "Men and Women," "Home," "The Pioneer," "Books" and "The Month" are the others, and each one is, in its particular field, excellent.

All in all, it is an admirable number, and one of which the publishers may well feel proud.
