CHAPTER OF ACCIDENTS

AT PORTER MILL

John Hill's Miraculous Escape, Big Double Circulars Badly Wrecked

Things went wrong at the Porter mill yesterday, and it seems miraculous that no fatalities are to be recorded.

John Hill had his clothing caught by a bolt on a pulley and he was disrobed with the greatest dispatch, only one sock and one shoe being left on him.

Then something went wrong at the big double circulars. The saws were both broken in pieces, the boxes, and arbors were broken, and things were riddled generally.

The delay is especially annoying to Mr. Simpson at this time, when both mills are over run with orders.

NEW SAW MILL AT NORTH BEND

Fifty Thousand Capacity Mill To Be Built At The New Townsite

The MAIL is informed on the best of authority that G. Levelle, the sawmill man who has been on the Bay and Coquille for some time, and who, it was said, would build a mill at Coquille City, will build at North Bend instead.

He has closed the deal with L. J. Simpson and will put up a mill of something over 50,000 capacity, the site being just north of the present Yarrow wharf.

This will be a valuable acquisition to the industries of the bay, and it is a matter of congratulation that Mr. Levelle has concluded to accept the offer made him by Mr. Simpson, which is understood to have been a liberal one.

Work on the Dallas & Falls City railroad has resumed. The first engine for the road is expected soon.

RECOMMENDATIONS IN GOVERNOR'S MESSAGE

Appointment of a commission to prepare a general assessment law, to thus correct the evils of inequality and non-uniformity.

Taxing corporations to thus add to the state's revenue.

Placing state officers on flat salaries. Have books of all state and county officials inspected at regular intervals. Enlargement of the jurisdiction and power of the circuit courts with reference to youthful criminals between the age of 16 and 21.

Executions for murder should be done at the Penitentiary, and all such bodies forfeited to the state.

Sailor boarding house nuisance ought to be severely dealt with.

Improve the public school system in the districts outside of cities.

Have but two Normal Schools under state aid.

Regulate pilotage rates at the mouth of the Columbia river.

Repeal laws providing for a health officer with a boatman at Astoria thereby cutting off a sinecure of \$1500 per annum.

Establish a Bureau of Labor or appoint a Commissioner to report to the next Legislature regarding the relative conditions of capital and labor in Oregon.

Pass some legislation to give initiative and referendum amendment a fair trial.

Relatives of the state insane and also the incorrigibles at the Reform School should be made to assist in the support of such wards.

State should own and operate its own light plant.

The Columbia and Willamette rivers ought to be opened and free for navigation.

Boys' and Girls' Aid Society deserves support by the state.

Legislation is needed governing water and riparian rights.

Liberal appropriation for the Lewis and Clark Exposition.

Oregon Historical Society should receive state support.

Redistrict the state into Senatorial and Representative Districts upon a basis of justice to the people instead of in the interests of any political party.
