BAD SCANDAL

One of the Prison Inmates In a Precarious Condition.

On the voluntary testimony of Mrs. Rose Carlisle, one of the two female convicts at the State Penitentiary, and who says that she is in a delicate condition. Second Warden A. C. Dilly and Druggist Gordon Hull have been suspended by Governor Chamberlain and Superintendent J. D. Lee, pending a full investigation which is to be made into the facts of the case. Mrs. Carlisle accuses Dilly of being responsible for her condition, and Hull is held because he has been aware of the facts in the case and has failed to report them to the proper authorities.

Mrs. Rose Carlisle was sentenced from Jackson County to serve nine years for the crime of arson, and she has already served 2 1/2 years of that time. Now that the matter is being investigated she talked freely to the Governor, and told him she had been in a delicate condition for four months. Another man than Dilly had access to the cells of the women, Convict White, a trusty who acted as prison nurse, and who, it will be remembered, made his escape some 19 days ago. There was some disposition to throw the blame on him, but according to Governor Chamberlain, the woman makes her charges against Dilly. The latter is a Salem man, being a widower with one child. Second Warden Dilly received his appointment from Governor Geer. He is well known in this locality, having been Chief of Police in Salem.
 Hull, the suspended druggist, is from Nehalem. It is charged that he has been acquainted with the facts in the case, and was acquainted with them before White made his escape, but made no report. Governor Chamberlain declares he will probe the case to the bottom. Dilly, of course disavows the charge made.

FRESHET ON THE UMPQUA

Some Logs Lost And Drain Route Blocked For Stages

 The exceptionally heavy rains and snows which have fallen in this section within the past week or ten days were undoubtedly general throughout the south central portion of the state. The first part of this week found the Umpqua River higher by several inches than it has previously registered at any time this winter, and some say it was equally as high as the memorable freshet of 1899. Loggers on both rivers have been having much trouble with their booms and rafts and as a result over 500 logs are along the beach at the mouth of the river. Reports from the outside have reached us to the effect that several bridges have been washed away on the Drain and Scottsburg road and the heavy slides in the mountainous sections have entirely blocked travel so as stage or wagon is concerned. Our mail which comes daily from Drain station on the rail ad is now being carried by means of pack horses, and report say that it will in all probability be yet several days before the slides can be removed and the bridges repaired sufficiently for stage travel again.
