

**HOW ED WHITE MET HIS DEATH**  
Wounded Through the Body by a Deputy Sheriff, Shoots Himself.

In a desperate encounter Ed White, the convict who recently escaped from the Oregon penitentiary, was killed near Eddyville Feb. 4th. After receiving a shot through the body from a Winchester rifle in the hands of Deputy Sheriff Robert Warnock. White turned his 44-caliber Colt's revolver to his own forehead and sent a ball into his brain. He died five minutes afterward.

The encounter happened in the vicinity of Robert Warnock's house. After the encounter Sunday, White crossed Alesia Bay to Lutjens and traveled north and east. Monday night he spent in a barn owned by Charles Bruner, and Tuesday was seen in the Chitwood Schoolhouse, from which he was driven by persons who were going there to hold a meeting. From there he went eastward up the river, where he obtained breakfast at a farmhouse. His whereabouts had become known to officers, and they were in pursuit. Wednesday he passed down the Yaquina River to the vicinity of the Warnock farm. There while passing up the railroad track with Section Foreman Hewitt on a handcar. Robert Warnock observed a man answering White's description on the county road. When he noticed the handcar, and its occupants the convict proceeded to secrete himself in the brush near. The handcar passed on a distance of 150 yards beyond White, when Warnock alighted and returned to the place where the convict had disappeared. Within a few minutes White was discovered moving along in the lane leading past Warnock's house. The house was only about 90 yards distant from the convict's late hiding place, and shores was tied to the fence in front. Warnock at once ordered the convict to halt and throw up his hands. White turned quickly and presented his revolver as if to shoot. Warnock at once leveled his Winchester, and, without firing his revolver, White turned an ran toward the horse. Warnock opened fire, the first shot being for the purpose of inducing the fugitive to halt. White, however, ran to the horse and lost several seconds in untying the animal. Then he attempted to mount, when a ball from the officer's rifle passed through his clothing. Then White, hastily changing his plan, left the horse and started to run to the barn near the Warnock house. He had gone but a short distance when a ball from the Winchester stopped his flight. It entered the small of the back, and White staggered and dropped to his knees. While in this position he placed the muzzle of his revolver against his forehead and pulled the trigger.

Within a few minutes Sheriff Ross, who had also been in pursuit, joined Warnock. When the officers reached him White was still alive, but he died five minutes afterwards. When reached he was lying on his face. His right hand with thumb on the trigger clasped the handle, and his left held the muzzle of his revolver, just as he clasped the weapon when he took his own life. His hat lay near by, and was burning at the point where it had been set on fire by the discharge of the revolver.

The body was taken to Eddyville, where a coroner's inquest was held. The verdict exonerated the deputy Sher-

iff from all blame and found that the fugitive came to his death by a gunshot wound inflicted by Warnock and by his own hand.

**NORTHWESTERN RAILROAD INCREASING ITS CAPITAL**  
Chicago, Ill. Feb 10:—In accordance with the plan approved recently by the directors of the Chicago & Northwestern railroad the stockholders of the company met in special session today to vote on the proposition to increase the capital stock of the company to \$100,000,000. As the total preferred and common stock of the Chicago & Northwestern amounts to \$61,500,000 the amount of the proposed increase is \$38,500,000. No official announcement has been made of the purpose of the increase, but it is understood the proceeds will be used to reimburse the treasury for various expenditures made during the last few years for extraordinary improvements and betterments, and which were met out of the current earnings. It is understood that the stock authorized and not issued will remain in the company's treasury to provide for future contingencies.

In addition to acting on the proposed increase in stock the meeting today will also authorize the purchase of the railroad franchise and property of the Fremont, Elkhorn and Missouri Valley road. The purchase will be mainly a matter of book-keeping, as the road's stock is already owned for the most part by the Northwestern.

**Washington, Feb. 10.—Henderson is practically deposed from the speakership of the House. President Roosevelt has informed him that he is not to be considered in the White House conference from now on. He was not present at the trust conference last night.**

**When Henderson's active part in pushing the substitute bill acceptable to the trusts became known, Roosevelt advised all friends in the House to cease consulting Henderson, and declared he would have nothing more to do with him.**

**The substitute mentioned is one favored by Rockefeller, the one causing the famous telegrams. At the time Speaker Henderson refused to stand for reelection the country was surprised, but those on the inside realized that the influence brought to bear on him forced to take that action. The position taken by him on the trust bill simply made an excuse for leaving him out of all conferences, for the reason that he could no longer be depended on, on account of his habits.**

Both men have completed their training and appear to be in good shape for the bout. **ANOTHER STEAMER FOR COOS BAY To Be Built At The Kruse Ship Yard For San Francisco Trade**

It seems likely at this time that the next vessel to be built at the Kruse shipyard will be a fine passenger and freight steamer to ply between this port and San Francisco. It is proposed that the boat shall be built by San Francisco and Coos Bay capital, a good proportion of the stock to be owned on the Bay. It is now stated on the authority of Capt. Colestrup that arrangements are practically completed, and the steamer will be constructed and placed on the route. She will have a carrying capacity of about 300,000 feet of lumber, besides miscellaneous freight. She will also have accommodations for about 30 first-class passengers.

There will be plenty of business for a boat of this kind, and in the line of passengers travel she is badly needed. That she is to be constructed on the Bay is a matter of congratulation and will give the people here a feeling of interest in her.
