**Hatchery Destroyed**

Since the waters have lowered sufficiently to allow those from the outlying districts to come in, it has been learned that the Elk Creek Hatchery on Rogue River was almost completely destroyed by the flood. The main building, the out houses, barn, dam, water wheel, tanks, and other property belonging to the hatchery were either washed away or damaged. A number of fish from which the commission intended to take eggs, and which were confined in a pond near the hatchery, were lost, as the water rose high enough to allow their escape.

**Tenmile Improvements**

Chas. Norris, of Tenmile was in town over Sunday. He is making preparations to receive the Summer visitors who will seek the lakes this season for camping, hunting and fishing. Mr. Norris will build a number of skiffs to let on the lakes, and will also erect

some buildings and furnish some conveniences for ladies and families at his place near Lake post office.

People are finding out that the lakes are an ideal place for an outing, and the number of visitors last year showed an increase of ten to one over the year before.

Mr. Norris says that there is bitter complaint among the settlers on the lake at the condition of the road from the beach to the creamery. It seems that a bridge over Tenmile creek is in a dangerous condition, and freight is delayed at that point. Mr. Norris thinks the county court should look after this matter at once.

**WHY HERMANN RESIGNED**

**FROM THE LAND OFFICE**

Being asked regarding the cause of his resignation as Commissioner of the General Land Office Mr. Hermann stated:

"I voluntarily resigned pursuant to a resolution made by me about a year ago. I resigned because of the arduous duties connected with the office. When I became commissioner the business of the office amounted to about \$2,000,000 the first year. When I left it amounted to \$9,000,000. It is one of the most trying positions in the government of the United States. The duties were becoming so irksome that I was glad to be relieved of them.

"Secretary Hitchcock and myself have disagreed as to the policy of the office for a long time," he continued.
