Fortunate Escape From Very Serious Accident

The steamer Flyer and launch Hannah came into collision about 8:40 Saturday evening, below North Bend. The launch was returning from Empire having aboard, lesides Captain W. S. W weier, Mrs. Wheeler and Rev. Wm. Horsfall. The Fiver was bound for Empire with an excursion to the masquerade. The collision occured about 150 yards below the sand point.

After the collision became inevitable, the presence of mind or Capuin Pendegrass saved more s-rious consequences. He had slowed down, but seeing the course of the launch would take her across his bow and that she could not clear, le range for full speed and shot shead at that the launch struck the steamer on the starboard bow about ten teet from the stem. The upper part of the stem of the launch was shattered and five of the steamers planks were broken, but otherwise neither boat was seriously damaged, and neither sprung a leak, Atter sucertaining the small extent of his damages. Capt. Wareler proceeded on his way. The Flyer turneb aroundlbut finding the launch apparently uninjured also resumed Ler

INSPECTING THE UMPQUA

Preliminary Move Looking Toward Improvement,

(Gardiner Gazette)

Assistant U. S. Civil Engineer David B. Odgen was here inspecting the bar at the month of the river and looking up the Umrqua commerce and shipping statistics this week This is the initial step of the Government toward a jetty for the Umpqua River. As to what Mr. Ogden's report will be we'are unable to eav, but it is eafe to assume that he realizes the necessity of deeper water at this port. Natural inlets on the Pacific Coast are few and far between, and one of such poscibilities as this should no longer be overlooked At precent the Umpqua exports are light, not necessarily because of a limited production or the limited reconress or facilitles for producing, but because of the limited means of transporting them to a market. This river taps a large agricultural, timber and mining section, and carrier a better volume of water than any river west of the Cascades. and the advent of a deep-water port at it's mouth would mean the opening and development of a large and productive terrritory, hitherto of small consequence in the commercial echools of the state.

MR. BARNARD EXPLAINS

Why the Mail Was Delayed So Long By The Late Storit

Mail Pub. Co. Marshfield Ore. Gentleman :-

In your issue of Feb 5th you score the mail contractor for not getting the mail through during the snow blockade and say you have bad the same trouble with former contractors. I suppose you have and always will have until you make some provision for keeping the road open over the mountain in the

Now as to facts, on Saturday the storm was very bad but we got through pretty well. On Sunday morning we left Sitkum about 4 o'clock and got through to Reston at dark and the snow and timber were falling very bad and the men and horses were completely played out. I tried to get the Coos county judge but the wires were all down, and as Mr. Laird had notified him, I took it for granted that Coos county would be at work on that end, Instead when my crew got the road opened on Thursday they met the Coos county men just coming to work. I understand they could not get the men out in the storm.

Judge Thompson of Douglas county, told me to send a man out and get a crew to work on this end. which I did, after promising to pay them \$2.50 per day, and they earned it, as they went from 4 to 8 miles from any house and put in all the daylight there was, furnishing their own horses.

I told the men not to stop when they reached the Coos county line, but to clear the road as quickly as possible, and keep track of the time worked in each county and I expect Coos county to reimburse me for money expended in

Now you people seem to think when a man takes a mail contract be must carry it and fix his own roads. High water and snow cannot be helped, but Coos county must keep the timber and elides out of the road if they expect to get mail on time.

I have written the P. O. department to send an inspector over the road, if here is a complaint sent in, so as to determine where the fault lies, as I understand that they have decided to discontinue the service where the roads are not kept in a passable condition.

I no not think there is a city in Oregon if the size of Marshfield that has any better mail service. There was an inspector here in January and he said there was tone and tone of delayed mail piled up in Portland which could not all he moved inside of three days.

During December and January, I waited from 1 to 2 hours nearly every day in order to get all of the mail, as it is just as disagreeable to me as it is to the people to have the mail come all in a a bunch, and I would like to give the people good service and have their good will in return.

a brick. W think so yet. We think the centractors who carry over the mountain made a serious mi take in not bringing at least the letter mail through, instead of lefting the whole service come to a stand-till for four or five days while the road was being opened, when the repairers of the telegraph line could get through with their horses and outfit, it would certainly have been possible to get the letter mail through, and the line was repaired and w rking over the mountain before the first mail was brought over.

People here do not expect the impossible. They have been highly appreclative of the excellent service given by the present contractors, with the exception of one lapse, but they had a right to protest in that case,

The veiled threat to have the mail thrown back to the other route, if people here dare to com plain will hardly have 6 original town Coquitle City \$10. the effect of keeping them quiet, if they think they have cause for complaint.

In spits of the one lapse, which is understood here to have been the fault of a new enbeontractor, there is no doubt of Mr. Barnard's sincerity in desiring to give good service, and he will find that the good will of the people here will depend solely on his success in achieving his desite.
