

MORE TIME GIVEN

Panama Co Agrees to Extend Option
Alaska Boundary Treaty Ratified

Washington, March 3.—The answer of the Panama Canal Company regarding the extension of time on the option held by the United States after March 4th, was received by Cromwell this morning, who immediately took steps to know when a conference can be held, and Knox laid the answer before the Cabinet meeting.

It is understood that the company agrees to the desired extension as laid down by Knox ten days ago. It covers a reasonable time for ratification of the treaty only.

Herbert, British Ambassador, and Secretary Hay today exchanged ratifications of the Alaska boundary treaty.

Roosevelt Announces a Program
House and Senate Must do Business

Washington, March 3.—Through Secretary Moody, President Roosevelt this afternoon conveyed to several prominent members of the House his determination to call an extra session of both houses, unless satisfactory action be taken on the naval appropriation bill before adjournment of the present session.

The two houses are at odds over the particular types of ships to be constructed. The House is contending for three battle ships and one cruiser, while the Senate wants four battle ships of a smaller size and two armored cruisers.

Foss, chairman of the House Naval committee is one of the members to whom Moody made this declaration.

GREAT CENTRAL MATTERS
Major Kinney Making Preparations To Start the Belt Line

Major L. D. Kinney is making preparations for the resumption of active operations on the Bangor townsite in the near future.

Lumber was being taken over there yesterday, for the construction of a machine shop. The building is to be 30 by 60 feet in size and will be built at once.

A small crew is at work at Bangor now, and Major Kinney expects to have things going in good shape by the first day of April.

D. W. Small, the contractor on the Belt Line, will double his force at once, if he can get the men and teams, and will push the grading work as fast as possible, although the weather is not yet settled sufficiently for the prosecution of the work to the best advantage.

There seems little doubt that matters in connection with the Great Central project are on a satisfactory basis. One point on which the friends of the enterprise can congratulate themselves is that some of the false friends of the project are being unmasked. A Judas is more to be feared than an open enemy and the elimination of such from the councils and the management of the enterprise will make for its ultimate success.

EXTRA SESSION CALLED

Senate Must Attend to Treaties
Fulton Will Have Early Start

Democrats Still Filibustering

Washington, Mar. 2.—The President has issued a proclamation calling an extra session of the Senate.

Many senators have called on the president to urge the calling of a special session. This is an endorsement of his own well known views and strengthened his determination to have the pending treaties acted upon.

The two principal objects in view are Reciprocity Treaty with Cuba, and that with Colombia, concerning the Panama Canal.

Advocates of these measures are confident that both will be consummated.

Owing to this special session, Oregon's newly elected Senator Fulton, will take his seat immediately upon the meeting of the session, while otherwise he would not have done so until the regular session in December. This will prove an advantage to him in acquaintances, and getting familiar with the routine work. The session will probably be short. The President's idea in calling a special session at this time is that it affords an opportunity for the newly elected Senators to reach Washington.

Senator Grosvenor, of Ohio, from the Committee on rules, reported a new rule which will shut off roll call when demanded on previous question, and it limits debate to 10 minutes. If adopted this will end a portion of the filibustering.

The Senate this morning received the credentials of Levi Ankeny, the newly elected senator from Washington.

Filibustering was resumed in the House. Richardson raised the usual point of no quorum. Unfinished business, relative to adopting the conference report on the Alaska homestead bill was taken up.

Supreme Court opened its session at noon today by reading the Day's commission. The oath was then administered, after which the new Justice was assigned to the seat vacated by Shiras, his predecessor.

It is said that President Roosevelt fixed the time of reassembling of the Senate at the earliest possible date in the hope that he would be able to take his long promised western trip within a few weeks as he originally planned. His throat is much better.

In view of the fact that there was no necessity for the blistering naval demonstration by Great Britain, Germany and Italy, it would appear that the powers which proceeded decently toward the collection of their claims against Venezuela should have an equal, if not preferential, standing as creditors.

SENATORS CHOSEN FOR DELAWARE

One Union, One Regular Republican
Are Result of the Addicks Compromise

Dover, March 2.—Senator Allen, a Union Republican, former Congressman Ball, a regular Republican, were elected United States Senators by Delaware legislature this afternoon.
