Bear Railroad Magnates to N. Y.
Morgan, Gould and Harriman Hurry To Consult on Western Situation

New York, March 9—Three special trains all making the best possible time are bringing Morgan from Tampa, George Gould from Jacksonville, and Harriman from New Orleans to this city.

It is openly stated on the street that trouble over the Southern Pacific controversy is the cause of their homecoming.

Gould asked how much a special train would cost on the Atlantic Coast line to put him through, starting yesterday afternoon, to arrive in New York at 2 o'clock this afternoon, and was told \$1000. He accepted.

The first 172 miles was run in 152 minutes.

It is expected that the three magnates will hold a conference this afternoon by which adjustments will be made of all railway controversy in the West.

Salem is about to purchase a new chemical engine.

Salem City council has ordered some steel cells for the city jail also a female department.

James Baxter, oldest man in Yamhill county who died at Dayton on Feb. 27, leaves 133 decedents in that county.

The city of The Dalles will appropriate money to increase the city water supply from 800,000 to 2,000,000 gallons a day.

A new shingle mill is nearing completion Hillsboro. The new mill will have a capacity of 25,000 shingles a day.

Two Pacific University students were held up Tuesday night by thugs and robbed of their watches valued at about \$50.

The Washington committee on appropriations have recommended an appropriation of \$50,000 for the Lewis and Clark Fair.

The 8-year old daughter of John Tarsion, who resides near Sherwood, Oregon, who was helping burn brush was probably fatally burned Tuesday.

The body of Fred C. Dobler, manager of the Cornucopia mines of Baker was found Wednesday morning between the Last Chance and the Union-Companion mines bruised and mangled, under an avalanche of snow, by a searching party.

Little Eugene Cottle, a bright promising lad of eight Summers, son of Dr. W. I. Cottle, was crushed to death beneath the wheels of an "S" car, while at play Wednesday afternoon, at 5 o'clock on the corner of Front and Grant streets.

Deputy Grand Master S. M. Moran, A. E. & A. M., who is acting in the absence of Grand Master W. F. Butcher, received notice of the death of Grand Treasurer F. H. Alliston, and also a request for Masonic burial. The funeral was under the auspices of the Grand Lodge of Oregon, A. F. & A. M.

In Astoria, school dist. About \$31,000 of school bonds fall due during the coming summer and the school board has decided to redeem these by an issue of bonds for small amounts to be disposed of by popular subscription. The present bonds bear 6 per cent interest while the bonds to be issued will bear but 5 per cent interest.

Something of a sensation has been caused up Snake River by the discovery among the Snake brakes of what is supposed to be a diamond. The find was made by Will Haas, who lives at Fishhook Ferry, along with D. W. Page, who operates a small boat for passengers and teams from Walla Walla to the Franklin County side. The peculiar stone was picked up among the rocks.

The house of Mrs. A. E. Moore was broken into while all the family were away from home for the evening, and the house was completely ransacked. The burglary occurred between 7 and 9 o'clock. At the same time a horse disappeared from main street, where it had been tied while the owner was at church. It appears several other houses were molested during the evening, but without success.

The County Court of Lane county has authorized the payment of the \$1000 reward for the apprehension of E. E. Lyons, convicted murderer of the late Sheriff Withers. The contest was open to any man in the Fourth Regiment for the best score in five shots on the regulation 300-yard range. Sergeant Hunter's score was 23. There were two other scores of 23 made but as Hunter's was the best 23, being 4, 4, 5, 5, he was awarded the trophy. A battalion parade has been ordered for the occasion of the presentation. The medal is subject to challenge until won three times.

The expenditures of the counties of Oregon, exclusive of expenditures for road purposes for the year 1902, amounted to \$1,305,519.01. This is an increase of nearly \$160,000, or 15 per cent over 1901 when the expenditure was \$1,049,578.84.

The pool at present is the fleeces of about 12,000 goats, and will amount to about 50,000 or 60,000 pounds.
