It is hard to see why the "sport" comes in, in chasing a poor, unfortunate old doe, whose weak limbs are hardly able to bear the extra burden she is called on to carry at this time of year, and hear her pitiful bleats as she is maimed and torn by the yelping curs. No true hunter would see any sport in it; no man endowed with a particle of humanity would countenance it, and those who would be guilty of it should be made to understand that such acts will not be allowed to go unpunished."

In the prohibition contest in oratory at Albany, this week, E. L. Jones won first place.

The Ashland Normal school will expend \$1800 in addition to its library and laboratory.

Baker City is to have a street-car line, and the material has already been purchased.

Edward Lenoy of Wilsonville Or., is claimed to be the oldest man living in Oregon, being 98 years of age.

Astoria has called in all city warrant, endorsed prior to Jan. 31, 1903, and has also recently paid off \$10,000 of bonded indebtedness.

Arrivals from the Klondyke say that the trail between White Horse and Dawson is lined with dead and disabled horses.

The Bremner Logging Company have let a contract for doing the rock work on its new line of railway, which it is building to tap a large tract of timber near the headwaters of Young's River. A large force of men is now at work constructing the road, and all the rails excepting one carload have arrived.

Tom Goodpaster was arrested at Eugene Wednesday and was bound over to appear before the grand jury on a charge of assault with a dangerous weapon, having drawn a pistol on his brother Frank and threatened his life.

Josephine County has paid into the state treasury one-half of its state and agricultural taxes for the year 1903, as follows: State, \$2307.50; agricultural, \$112.50.

The rural telephone line extending across the Willamette at Independence is about completed, and will be in operation in a short time.

J. W. Smith and S. M. Lyman, who were caught with a boatload of copper wire and arrested at Astoria Tuesday night, are now thought to be responsible for one if not for a majority of the hold-ups that have occurred in Portland during the winter.

The Socialists at Eugene have challenged the Republicans to a joint debate, "In order that the voters of Eugene and vicinity may decide which party best represents them."

James Jones, a sheepman, was murdered on the south fork of the John Day river, 15 miles above Spray, and 50 miles southeast of Fossil. John Glick, who admits that he did the shooting, rode into Mitchell and gave himself up. The trouble between the two men arose over the use of a sheep range.

The semi-annual financial report of Columbia county officers for the six months ending March 31, has been completed and it shows a total in all the funds of nearly \$40,000. The total resources of the county are \$43,293.97, while the total liabilities are \$1329.05. Five years ago the county was \$79,000 in debt. Today she has as good as a bank account to her credit of \$40,000. A change of \$100,000 in five years.

There is one little girl in Washington who recently gave her parents an exhibition of her nature for which they were totally unprepared.
