

THE BUSH LEAGUERS

Wipe the Diamond With Valley Team

Chagrin is likely to possess the souls of the Roseburg people who saw their team start for Coos county a few days ago with such perfect confidence in their ability to clean up the Bush League, as the members of the Coos County Baseball League are known in the haunts of the Willamette Valley League.

The Roseburg team, so near capturing the Willamette Valley pennant, went down to defeat before the home team here yesterday by a score of 3 to 2 in a ten inning game, the Marshfield team still having a margin to spare when the game closed in the last half of the 10th by the making of the run which broke the tie created by each team making two in the ninth.

The attendance at the game was small in number, but enthusiastic, and the score of eight innings without a tally shows that they were afforded a rare treat.

Thursday's game will undoubtedly bring out a good crowd.

The game started at 1:05 sharp. Roseburg went to bat buoyant and with a sure-winner smile on their countenance, but after the first goose egg the smile on their faces was a standoff between a rosy hue of grin-and-ear-it and disappointment. They found the "bush-leaguers" were not so easy.

Kostal in the box was not so hard to find as our boys expected, and when little Jesse Low twirled they had to hunt and it took some time to find the sphere.

Morrow of the Roseburg nine demonstrated that he can exhaust more to the square inch than their whole band of players put together.

When Jesse Low smiled that smile of his you could almost count on a fan, and he found out 10 men, Joe Kostal late of the Portland Browns, fanning out only 7 in the ten innings.

Manser capped the climax in the tenth inning. The score stood 2 and 2. There were 2 men out and Wright on second, then Manser sent a three bagger and saved the day for Marshfield.

Marshfield scored two earned runs while Roseburg tried hard but couldn't get there with one to their credit.

The Umpire, Huitmiller was somewhat criticised but on the whole was as fair as any man could judge. The decisions were prompt and unreserved and inspired both clubs to the point of feeling that they were fairly dealt with.

The Roseburg team are all gentlemanly appearing and conducted themselves like true sportsmen in defeat. They gave the best they had and gave it freely and took in return their medicine without a whimper. If they keep up their good conduct each time they are whipped as they are now they will return to their home thinking better of the "bush-leaguers" and will no doubt be wiser ball players.

The Roseburg players married the bases after several unsuccessful engagements in stealing to second base on Jim Myers. They hardly stirred off from first base when he got the ball and tried to coax them to steal away. They found that he had a wing like a slingshot and threw like a David killing a Goliath, down in that direction usually afflicting the run of a Rosey burgher who was trekking down to visit Nadler.

FATAL ACCIDENT

TO G ISACKSEN

(Gardiner Gazette, Aug. 7)
While enroute from San Pedro to this port and about 100 miles south-west of the Umpqua bar, G. Isacksen, a sailor on the schooner Caroline met with an accident that resulted in his instant death, at 8 o'clock on Saturday morning August 4th.

Captain Westerdale had ordered the topsails shifted, sending Isacksen aloft. Isacksen was getting along very well at his work, when suddenly, and without apparent cause, he was heard to holler and the captain turned around just in time to see the body of the unfortunate sailor fall across a life boat which lay overturned on the deck. Isacksen had fallen 75 feet, striking with his head on the boom and falling over across the life boat 4 or 10 feet below. His head was split half open and he was of course dead before anyone reached him.

The burial took place at 2 o'clock that afternoon, with the usual ceremonies of a burial at sea.

The premium lists of the fall meeting of the Second Southern Oregon District Fair, which is to be held at Eugene are out. The fair is to last 5 days commencing Sept. 29th.

A dam in the Santiam ditch at Slayton was blown out by dynamite by some miscreant of a boy. This ditch supplies the power for the Salem mills and manufacturing plants.

Amounts ranging from 70 cents to \$66,000 are among the claims against the late H. W. Corbett, of Portland. About \$250,000 of claims have been presented to the county court thus far.
