The organization has eighteen members, including nearly all the clerks in town, and it is expected that others will soon be added to the roll. Meetings are held in the Eagles' hall on the 1st and 3rd Monday of each month.

### MORE MONEY FOR SCHOOLS

#### This Year's Tax Levy Will Provide It.

In making annual tax levies this month, County Courts will levy for school purposes a sum that will be equal to \$4 per capita upon the school population. Prior to this year the levy for school purposes has been 5 mills on the dollar. In some counties this produced a revenue much in excess of \$5 per capita, while in others it produced less. Upon the theory that school revenue should be based upon the number of children of school age rather than upon the assessed value of property in the county, the Legislature at its regular session in 1907 made the change above indicated. The act also provided that no county should levy a per capita amount less than the per capita for 1903. Throughout the state the change will result in an increase in the amount of money available for school purposes. In those counties which have heretofore received more than \$5 per capita no change is effected, but in others the rate of levy must be increased.

### ADVICE TO EMPLOYERS

#### How They Should Conduct Themselves Toward Employees

The following, from the American Merchant, is published at the request of a Marshfield merchant, who is talking of forming an employers' association with these for the bylaws.—Or he may only be joking the clerks.

Always raise your hat when addressing an employee. He is as good as you are and probably thinks he is a great deal better.

Never criticize a man's work, however poor. It is an insult to the union, which was organized by and for the poor workman, and besides it might hurt his feelings.

Encourage your men to play pinochle and checkers during working hours. It helps them drive dull care away and promotes good fellowship. This is especially important on an operation where different trades are employed, as it leads to a better acquaintance among the men, and they will hold together longer on a sympathetic strike.

Keep a keg of beer in a convenient place on all jobs. You will find the men appreciative. If any get balloons on, send them home in cabs.

Have an orchestra stationed where ever you have many employees at work. Never mind the expense as long as the men enjoy the music, but make sure the musicians carry union cards or accident insurance.

A nice reading room, a pool room and a bowling alley would be splendid, but no sensible workingman would expect you to make such provisions for his comfort and amusement.

Never hire a new man without first consulting your other employees. If he doesn't belong to a union they probably won't play. They may even prevent him from working, and they have a perfect right to do so. Remember—this is a free country!

Do not insist on long hours. No bank opens before 9 o'clock, and they usually close at 4.
