MORE [MONEY FOR SCHOOLS

This Year's Tax Levy Will Provide it.

(Cregonian)

In making annual tax levies this month, County Courts will levy for for school purposes a cum that will be equal to \$6 per capita upon the school population. Prior to this year the levy for school 'purposes has been 5 mills on the dollar. In some counties this produced a revenue, much in excess of \$ per capata, while in others it produced less. Upon the theory that school revonue should be based upon the number of children of school age rather than upon the assessed value of property in the county, the Legislature at its regufar sesson in 1907 made the change above indicated. The act also provided that no county should levy a per capita amount less than the per capita for 1203

Throughout the state the change will result in an increase in the amount of money available for school purposes. In those counties which have beretciore released more than \$1 per capita no change is effected, but in others the rate of levy must be increased.

DEAD IN THE SHELL

a Sense Thoughts on Hatcha-

Chicks dying is the only thing that prevents 100 per cent hatches. I care remember back to forty years ago, when hens made about the same average as they do now. I can remember a certain gatepost that I had for a mark when disposing of the eggs that the hens falled to hatch. Breaking the eggs to see what was in them was never thought of then and is not yet, but when it comes to running incubators it

is a different thing. I have seen people hatch 80 per cent and 90 per cent of the fertile eggs and worry over 10 or 20 per cent dying in the shell, yet the same people would perhaps innocently admit that the incubator did better average work on all

the eggs than the hens. There is just this about it: When 80 per cent of the fertile eggs hatch and 20 per cent do not hatch it is evidence to itself that something is wrong with the 20 per cent or they would have 1 00 hatched also. Why not mix in a little cool reasoning in comparing incubators with hens and do away with the unjustified prejudices? Good incubators equal good hens, but neither can hatch unhatchable eggs. If all fertile eggs were hatchable, then we would simply waste time in selecting strong, vigorous cockerels and hens. There, would be no use or sense in selecting fresh eggs; neither would freezing or overheating them before they were put in the machine af-1 50 .

These are stubborn, serious facts, and not a single reader of this paper will dispute them, yet many will continue to throw the eggs that the hens can't hatch at the gatepost and make a postmortem examination of the eggs that are left in the incubator, and, still more, they may unconsciously select eggs for the hens and fill the incubator with most any kind to make up the 82 19 numbers.—Commercial Poultry.

The Pullets For Next Year. The foundation of success with fow s 29 50 is to hatch all the pullets about the same time if possible or get them out early at least. Pullets of the large breeds should surely be batched before March 15 or not later than April 1 and those of smaller breeds not later than May 1. Attention is called to this ma ter, as there is now but little time lere for doing so. If the hens do not become broody get a small hundred egg incubittor and provide a place for a brooder. By hatching as many as possible about the same time they will all be of the same age when winter comes and will also be more uniform in other respects,

which will be much better than having them hatched at different periods, with some of them too late to mature and become profitable as winter layers. Sell or part with all of the cockerels as 5 75 soon as they are large enough to be marketed and thus save cost and give the pullets more room.-Western Poul-
