**TOM CRIPPS DROWNED**

A Logger Loses His Life on the North Fork of the Coquille

Thursday afternoon Tom Cripps, a logger, who has been working in the Pierce & Bradbury camp on the North Fork of the Coquille, about 30 miles above Coquille City was accidentally drowned.

There had been a jam of logs and the crew were at work breaking the jam and when the jam broke he remained too long on dangerous ground. The log on which he was standing began to move and as he tried to escape he went into the water. The water not being over three feet deep, he was caught and jammed between the logs and the bottom and about 200 logs passed right over him. Undoubtedly he was ground to shreds by the logs as many of them were dragging on the bottom. The body has not been recovered.

Mr. Cripps was a single man having one sister at North Bend and one at Bandon also, and a brother east of the mountains.

Dear Sir:—We notice your suggestion in the matter of establishing a pulp mill at Marshfield. That is a good move and we hope the promoters will succeed. But there is another enterprise that would be a great boon, not only to Marshfield, but to the whole county, that is, a condensed milk factory. Marshfield is the most accessible point in the county. Supposing a plant should be constructed at or near the depot, say on the site to the old match factory, the milk from all points of Coos Bay could be landed from the steamers, and the product from the Coquille river, from Bandon to Myrtle Point, could be delivered by the train at the factory. Why not agitate this along with other enterprises.

**Prospects for Afternoon Paper**

The proposal to make the DAILY COAST MAIL an afternoon instead of a morning paper, and increasing the service of press dispatches is being greeted with many expressions of gratification by our Marshfield patrons, and we are in hopes that the project can be carried out.

It may be well to explain to our out of town subscribers that the change would effect them in this way: that they would get the outside news no earlier but they would get more of it, and they would get practically all local news

as early as they do now.

Coming out in the late afternoon, the paper would contain the news of that day, both local and foreign, instead of coming out with it the next morning under a later date.

North Bend subscribers would get the paper the same day issued, as we would go to press in time to catch the last boat.

Marshfield subscribers could read the world's news of the day as early an hour as people in Portland or San Francisco. It would be about 42 hours ahead of the Portland Journal or Telegram, here, with the same news; 66 hours ahead of the Oregonian, and still further in advance of the San Francisco papers.
