YOUNG ALFONSO FRIGHTENED

By the Explosion of a Bomb

Madrid, Apr. 7.—An official dispatch from Barcelona reports the explosion of a petard, as King Alfonso was leaving the building in which the labor exhibition was being held.

Much excitement was caused by the belief that an attempt had been made on the King's life. When matters quieted down, two persons were found to be injured. A man thought he knew something of the cause of the explosion was arrested.

The dispatch adds that the reception granted the King by the population contrary to expectations, was most enthusiastic.

King Alfonso, accompanied by Premier Mañra and war minister Linarez, started this morning on a round of visits to the factories where they talked to the working people, praised the laborers and declared that no one has a greater desire to protect the working men.

BIG COAL LAND DEAL CLOSED

By Pacific Steel Company

San Diego, Cal. Apr. 6.—Subject to approval of the title by its attorneys, the Pacific Steel Co. today closed negotiations for the purchase of four thousand acres of coal land, together with the railway and coking plant, owned by the Tacoma Coal and Coke Co., located 42 miles from Tacoma.

The purchase price is six hundred and fifty thousand, and the plan is to ship coke by the steamer from Tacoma, to be used by the thirty million dollar Packing Steel plant to be established here.

Landing on Yalu

Tokio, April 7.—Word was received today that Japanese transports have entered the estuary of the Yalu river, and the troops are rapidly disembarking.

Transports Appear

Seoul, April 7.—An American missionary, returned from North Korea, reports that forty transports have appeared off Hainju, fifty miles north of Chemulpo. They are supposed to carry the Japanese army destined for Yong Ampo at the mouth of the Yalu.

Favors America

St. Petersburg, April 7.—The newspaper Russ, the Foreign Office favorite today reproves a contemporary for at-

tacking America. Germany, it says, is the only serious enemy of the Russians.

Merchants Murdered

Seoul, April 7.—The Japanese legation states that three Japanese merchants have been murdered as a result of the disorders in Chung Chung, a province in northern Korea.

COASTING

SCHOONER WRECKED

Victoria, Apr. 7.—The Canadian Pacific steamer Tees from the west coast of Vancouver island today brings news that the four masted schooner Kallia, Capt. Lars, was wrecked off Kyoquett island and all hands, numbering 9, are believed to have been drowned.

Gay Lothario Arrested

Berlin, Apr. 7.—The King of Saxony has ordered the arrest and expulsion of Lieut. Keglevich, who attempted to liberate Princess Louise.

Hawaiian Judge Removed

Washington, Apr. 7.—The President has removed Judge Kalua, of the second district of Hawaii. His successor will be appointed tomorrow.

Helena at Shanghai

Washington, Apr. 6.—The United States gunboat Helena, which has been stationed at Yankow, Manchuria, all winter, arrived at Shanghai this morning.

RUPTURE

NARROWLY AVERTED

Vienna, Apr. 7.—Drastic steps looking to a rupture in the diplomatic relations between Turkey and Bulgaria, have been averted through the action and advice of Natibovitch, the Bulgarian agent, which has brought a fresh proposal from Turkey.

FIRST

DIRT IS THROWN

Portland Ore., April 7.—At three this afternoon ground was broken for the Lewis & Clark Fair, with simple ceremonies. The first shovel of earth was thrown by Jefferson Myers, president of the State Board of Exposition Commissioners. A large crowd of officials and many prominent men of the state were present.

Washington, April 6.—The navy department announces that Governor Pardee has selected his daughter Florence, to christen the cruiser California.

CRISIS IN STREET CAR SITUATION

Company Preparing For Strike

San Francisco, Cal. April 6.—A crisis in the local street car situation is at hand. The time limit set by the unions for breaking in imported men, who, it is charged, are being brought here for the purpose of taking the old men's places in case of a strike expires at noon today. The unions say, if the men are ordered to continue to break in outsiders they will refuse and if discharged for refusal it would be practically impossible to prevent a strike.

San Francisco, Apr. 7.—No effort was made this morning to force the United Railways trainmen to break in imported men in opposition to the ultimatum handed to the company by the union Wednesday and which aroused fears that a strike might be precipitated at almost any moment.

In anticipation, however, of trouble when the wage scale is taken up, May 1, the company arranged to have the imported men broken in by the train dispatchers, department superintendents and other employees, whose position does not compel them to belong to the union. Heavy wire screens are being placed over the car barn windows and cooking ranges and banks are being put up in the barns. Wagon loads of provisions are being taken in.

MORE ABOUT NEW CANNERY

Will be Largest Outside of Columbia River

Further particulars have been received touching the new cannery at North Bend, for which arrangements have been completed by L. J. Simpson on his present trip to Portland.

It will be the largest on the coast, outside of the Columbia river, and will not only can salmon but cranberries and clams and will also put up cordons and fruit.

There will be a cold storage plant in connection, and the plant will be complete and up to date in every particular. Mr. Timmons, the Columbia river cannery man is behind the new project and his thorough experience in the cannery business insures the successful operation of the plant, while his connection with the world's markets will be a great factor in the marketing of the product. Mr. Timmons has gone East from Portland to purchase machinery for the new plant, and by the time that he reaches here the building will be ready. The site has not yet been determined.

It is needless to point out that this will be an important addition to the industrial equipment of our sister town, and that the whole Bay will be benefited by the marketing of the product of our waters, flats and orchards, and that the industry is started on a scale and by people who insure its permanency.

All Quiet At Panama

Panama, Apr. 7.—All traffic is suspended account of the strike. All is quiet and the authorities are prepared to maintain order.

DENY STRIKE IS IMMINENT

Los Angeles, Apr. 6.—Official of the Santa Fe deny that a strike is eminent, but preparations for the defense in the event of disorder are going forward and a large number of deputy and special police men have been sworn.

PIONEER BRUTALLY MURDERED

Nevada City, Cal. Apr. 7.—Wm. Bown, a pioneer, was beaten to death in his home last night by a party unknown. Every room was ransacked by the murderer, who secured three watches, one from the victim. There were twenty wounds on the head and body.

DEATH ON THE RAIL

Four Fatal Train Collisions

Parkersburg, Wa. Vs., April 7.—The West bound B. & O. Express collided with a fast freight, at two this morning, in a tunnel near West Union.

Freight conductor Ford was killed, freight engineer Pellington and fireman Thorndale were fatally injured, Engineer Schifer, Fireman Bean and a passenger were seriously hurt and several passengers slightly injured.

Chicago, April 7.—Three Nebraska Indians were killed, 23 injured, three fatally and engineer Foreman was slightly hurt in a rear end collision on the Chicago and Northwestern Suburban line at Melrose Park early this morning.

The Ouaba Express which was twenty minutes late was stopped by a block, and was run into by the fast mail, in the dense fog. The engine plowed into the rear coach, in which were the Indians, bound for the east. Their bodies were tossed in every direction by the pilot and the coach was completely demolished.

The Indian's were Buffalo Bill's men enroute to Europe to join the show. The party was led by chief High Bear and are the last of a band of sixty from the Pine Ridge agency which were to go to Europe on the ninth from New York. The Indians lost their natural stoicism and seemed crazed with terror. They ran about wildly covered with blood, paint and feathers. Later they held a pow wow to decide whether to continue their journey.

Baltimore, April 7.—The Baltimore and Ohio passenger this morning smashed into a switch engine at Huntington Ave. tunnel, killing Engineer Donnelly of the passenger train. Several passengers were injured.

San Dusky, Ohio Apr. 7.—Two Lake-side and Marble Head railway freighters collided this morning, killing Fireman Deal and brakeman Pokey, and fatally injuring brakeman Brady, and seriously injuring Engineer Ullrich and brakeman Ward.

PREPARE FOR ADJOURNMENT

Washington, April 7.—An agreement has reached the House leaders postponing impeachment proceedings against Judge Swayne of Florida, till next December, clearing the way for adjournment in two or three weeks.
