Belligerents Should be Called Down Warns Turkey as to Her Policy

Vienna, May 16—Count Golonchowski, minister of foreign affairs in a speech to delegations from Budapest today expressed the belief that the Russo-Japanese war would be localized.

As to the extended notions of contraband of war now held by belligerents, it is time the powers agreed that a check be put to this evil.

He warned Turkey against the suicidal policy of playing into the hands of those who argue that she is incapable of reforms and who would make her undergo more drastic operation than that of Murteq.

Communication Cut Off for Three Days

HEAVY FIGHTING AT LIA YANG

Kuropatkin to Await Reinforcements at Harbin—Japanese Cruiser Miyako Sunk by Mine—Editor Talks

No Communication

New Chwang, 16, May 16—Russian authorities here admit that the railway to Port Arthur has practically ceased working and there has been no telegraphic communication for three days.

Word was received today that the Japanese dispatch boat *Miyako* struck a mine and was destroyed in the bay Sunday with eight casualties.

Natives here have a rumor of heavy fighting Sunday between Japanese and Russian forces at Lia Yang.

The Russo-Chinese bank was removed today to the building occupied by the French consulate.

Will Await Reinforcements

St. Petersburg, May 16—Rumors today, credited to a reliable source, have it that Kuropatkin will retreat from Lia Yang to Harbin with 120,000 men, there to await 100,000 reinforcements from Kharkeof and Moscow before engaging the enemy. Kuropatkin has asked for telegraphic and field equipment necessary for his operations.

Cruiser Miyako Sunk

Washington, May 16—According to a Tokio dispatch from the Japanese legislation, it was the cruiser *Miyako* which was sunk by a mine in Kerr bay. The dispatch reads: "Admiral Kataoka reports on the 14th, four torpedo boats of the flotilla continued the sea-sweeping operations under cover of the fleet. The enemy constructed temporary batteries on the promontory between Kerr bay and Tallenwan, and placed six field guns beside a hastily constructed fort, where with one company of soldiers they stubbornly resisted our attack. 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fire, carried out the operations and destroyed five mines laid by the enemy. Unfortunately one exploded and sunk our cruiser *Miyako*. In this accident six men were wounded besides two killed during the fight."

Russian Editor Talks

St. Louis, May 16—Prince Oukhtomsky, editor of the *St. Petersburg Weidomosti*, representing Russia in the Press Congress, discussing the Russo-Japanese war declared the present war is not popular in his country because few people outside the government, army and navy, and residents in the large cities know that there is a war.

The New Russian reverses must sooner or later reach the general populace when the war becomes popular. Russia will send millions of troops into the field, when necessary. Talk of peace is idle. There will be none until Russia asserts her supremacy in the territory at stake.

Russians Plunder Miners

London, May 16—The Central News Tokio correspondent says that Seoul reports that several hundred Russians attacked and plundered British gold miners at Eusanpy, in northern Korea. Several were taken prisoners.

Railroad Destroyed

St. Petersburg, May 16—Official advices today say the Japanese have destroyed fifty miles of railroad north of Kinchou.

Khilkova Fears Capture

St. Petersburg, May 16—Prince Khilkova, Minister of Railways, has decided not to go to Vladivostok's he fears capture by the Japanese enroute.

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ANARCHISTS MAY BE EXCLUDED

Opinion Rendered in Turner Case

Washington, May 16—The Supreme court has held that Wm. Turner, the British anarchist, was rightfully excluded from this country by the Secretary of Commerce. The order of the court below in affirming the power of congress to legislate for the exclusion of anarchists is fully sustained.

Turner's speeches are held to be incitements to use force against the prevailing government, and Turner himself to be a man dangerous to the public welfare. Turner is out on bail, and recently returned to England.

TROUBLE EXPECTED IN DENVER

Excitement Over Tuesday's Election

Denver, May 16—Intense interest is manifested in the city election tomorrow first under the new charter, and there are predictions of bloodshed, especially in the lower wards. The election is for a full set of county and city officers for four years, and during that period many valuable public franchises will come up for renewal.

Republican leaders are accusing Governor Peabody of treachery to the party in his refusal to call out the militia and prevent trouble. The Democrats control the police and election machinery.

GERMANS MASSACRED BY BLACKS

Berlin, May 16—A dispatch today reports the massacre of Germans by Hereros in German south west of Africa. Three colonists were killed at Okombah, three German women and one child at Aneib, five other whites in the Karibib district. The blacks buried their victims, then died on their graves.

CORBETT AND BRITT MATCHED

New York, May 16—Jimmie Britt and young Corbett were matched today for twenty rounds for the feather weight championship, to be fought Dec. 31 at San Francisco. The club offering the largest purse will get the fight. Details will be arranged Sept. 15th when the managers meet to sign up.

ILLINOIS DEADLOCK CONTINUES

Delegates Liable to Fly the Coop

Yates Creates a Big Sensation

Springfield, May 16—On the surface of the Republican situation here this morning it did not look any more probable that a nomination for governor would be made at the state convention, this afternoon than at any time last week.

Several dark horses are mentioned, including Federal Judge Graessner, Graeme Stewart, late candidate for Mayor of Chicago, and Congressman Reeves.

Lowden and Deneu delegates from Chicago are as far apart as Genesis from Revelations.

A great many of the delegates are weary of the deadlock and are liable to vote any way to settle the office. Senator Hopkins is of the opinion that the convention won't last much longer.

The twenty-fifth ballot was taken shortly after 2 o'clock.

Springfield, May 16—Governor Yates today created a sensation by confirming the story printed in local papers, that he had been approached in the interests of the congressional delegation, meaning Cannon, Hopkins and Cullom, with an offer of the Mexican ministership on a salary of \$18,000 a year if he would throw the gubernatorial nomination to Lowden.

Springfield, May 16—The twenty-sixth ballot brought Cannon one, Yates lost five and Lowden five. The Yates men are holding a conference.

King Edward to Visit Kaiser

Berlin, May 16—It is officially announced that King Edward has expressed a desire to visit the Kaiser during Kiel Regatta week, in June. The Kaiser will arrange grand festivities at Kiel in honor of the visit.
