How Marshfield Will Observe the Nation's Holiday

Following is the program, so far as completed, of the coming Fourth of July celebration:

THIRTEEN GUNS AT SUNDOWN

Nine o'clock boat race, prize \$15.

At 10 o'clock a parade will form at Eagles hall under the management of Ed Colgan, Marshal of the Day, headed by the Marshfield Fire Department and North Bond Concert Bands.

The line of march will be through the principal streets of the city concluding at Bow's pavilion, at the foot of Front street, which will be profusely decorated and where the exercises of the morning will be held.

Prominent speakers will be heard.

Patriotic music by both bands and choir under the leadership of Mrs. C. W. Tower.

At conclusion of exercises in the pavilion, lunch will be served on the grounds under the management of Dr. Hayden and George N. Farvin.

Cham, stew, sliced elms, boiled crabs, collies, and bread sandwiches will be served in abundant quantities. At 2 o'clock the following list of sports will be carried out on Broadway street:

100 yds. foot race, free for all, prize \$15.

100 yds. foot race, boys 15 years and under first \$5, second \$2.50.

50 yds. foot race boys 12 years and under first \$5, second \$2.50.

Back race, boys 18 and under, first \$5, second \$2.50.

Girls' race, 16 and under first \$5, second \$2.

Potato race, free for all, first \$5, second \$2.50.

High jump \$5.

High wire and slack rope performance by aerial artist of fame.

Horse contest between crack teams of Marshfield Fire department.

A lively buck contest will conclude the afternoon sports.

EVENING

The James Keane Co. will open in the Masonic theatre in one of their celebrated plays, performance to begin at 7 o'clock.

ELABORATE CARNIVAL

Run by a Queen to be selected by a popular vote of the different towns in the county.

The Queen and her Court of Honor, in her barge of state will parade the water front followed by thirteen decorated launches representing the original thirteen states.

Mr. T. J. Lewis, under whose management this feature will be conducted, has had much experience in such work and promises something novel and interesting.

A special selection of elaborate fire works will be displayed during this time.

Exercises of the day will end with a grand free ball in the pavilion especially prepared for the occasion.

ROOSEVELT AND FAIRBANKS

WILL BE CHOICE OF CONVENTION

Machine Politicians get a Hunch

COMMON PEOPLE ARE HEARD FROM

Overwhelming Enthusiasm for Roosevelt-Fairbanks Practically Certain to be Named--Early Adjournment

Chicago, June 21.—If there was any doubt about the nomination of Fairbanks for vice president, late developments have set it at rest. When Pennsylvania and New York fell into line other's boomlets did not have any legs to stand on. Cannon's forceful and picturesque expression on the subject of his candidacy settled the matter, so far as the New York scheme to nominate him was concerned. Roosevelt kept his hands out of the fight, but Cornelius Bliss, who represents the President, was consulted and acquiesced in the program. There will be no fight in the convention, although there may be complimentary votes for a number of others, whose enthusiastic friends refuse to permit the withdrawal of their names.

Rebellious talk against the selection of Cortelyou for the national chairmanship has almost entirely subsided, nor is there longer any talk of a compromise, looking either to Cortelyou's selection and subsequent resignation or looking to the selection of Cortelyou as chairman of the executive committee and the choice of some one else, to preside over the national committee itself. Cortelyou is detained in New York on account of the Slocum disaster, but is expected here Wednesday. His coming, however, will have little effect on the situation.

The hopes of the tariff re-adjusters for a revision plank in the platform are doomed to disappointment, but little talk being heard foreshadowing the slightest concessions on the part of the "Stand Patters," but the western delegates continue the agitation against polygamy.

It is a Roosevelt convention now. A change has come with the arrival of the great mass of delegates and thousands of hustling Republicans. Roosevelt badges galore adorn the coats of men to be seen on the streets, men not registered among the leaders of parlor conferences.

Until Monday the leaders held sway. They were the old guard of machine organization, whose one great purpose was to perpetuate their rule, some of whom were anti-Roosevelt, and in whose eyes the President was a political accident, who had to be given the re-nomination by force of circumstances. They threw cold water when ever Roosevelt sentiment appeared, ignored the President in convention arrangements and had not thought of him

in planning the decorations. Most important of all, they decided that one of their own selection should be the new chairman of the national committee and leader of the party.

Then it was the President's friends on the ground made a determined stand, insisting that Cortelyou should have the place. These Roosevelt men stood by their guns until the army of delegates began flocking in on Sunday night.

Monday the entire force arrived and the old guard machine were routed. Talk to one of them today and you will get the meek statement that Cortelyou will be chairman and they are for him. They have heard from the little fellows who represent the districts and who are direct from the people, and they find a mighty sentiment among the mass of Republicans in favor of Roosevelt. The last of the old organization to be displaced on the national committee by new men include Kerens, of Missouri; Sheldon, of New York; Stewart, of Illinois; and Hawley, of Texas.

The old machine has been shattered. Roosevelt is leader, his picture now hangs in public places and looks forth from badges, his name figures in the conversation of groups of men and the cheers of the crowds.

The convention hall presented a brilliant scene of color this morning. Hanging as a sort of canopy above the single gallery a long festooned strip of red, white and blue bunting stretched from end to end of the vast amphitheatre. From each point where the bunting was caught up was suspended a large hanging basket of graceful ferns. Above every second one there was tastefully arranged a group of five American flags, in the bosom of whose folds was presented a picture of President Roosevelt. Between these stands of flags boughs of trees were placed, the green foliage affording a pleasant relief to the eye.

The officers of the convention made their appearance on the platform at 10:30, while very few people were in the hall. About 11 the coliseum began to fill, the earliest arrivals being four women alternates from Idaho, Utah and Colorado. Half an hour later not more than fifty delegates were in their seats. The first full delegation was from Delaware under Adkins' leadership. The Oklahoma men

with their sombreros came next. The first applause of the day from the galleries came with the advent of a party accepted by the convention, but the head. Senators Depew and Cullem were the recipients of applause which doubled a few minutes later when Uncle Cannon entered with Cornelius Bliss. At 11:45 Postmaster General Payne, the presiding officer made his way to the platform, accompanied by temporary chairman Root. Everyone in the hall joined in the greeting. Delegates now came in droves, and in twenty minutes nearly all were present, but the galleries were not half full. There were few ladies present, compared with the last conventions. The first real enthusiasm came when Fairbanks with the Indiana delegation entered the hall. The people howled and clapped their hands but it was all over in a few seconds and quiet reigned again.

The regular preliminaries had been so mild that this enthusiastic opening was hailed as good omen. Uncle Joe Cannon wore an expansive smile when cheers swelled up for Fairbanks. It made plain the fact that the delegates had boarded the Fairbanks' wagon.

Swinging his two handed bug starter, Payne rapped for order and quiet ensued, while the chaplain prayed. Senator Scott got a hand as he stepped to the front to present a gavel from the Chicago committee to Payne, after which reading clerk Malloy let loose his fog horn.

Hanna's name was received with a storm of applause.

The first mention of Roosevelt came from Gov. Vansant, of Minn., and a cheer long drawn out followed and died away, occupying two minutes of time.

IMPRISONED CORRESPONDENT HEARD FROM

Tells Real Conditions at Port Arthur After Experience in Prison

Indianapolis, June 20.—Hector Fuller, staff correspondent of the News, cables his paper from Chefoo today: "After spending five days in a Russian prison, I was released, put aboard a Chinese junk and sent to this place.

"The stories of the starvation of Port Arthur spread by the Japanese are as untrue as the stories that supplies are constantly arriving at the beleaguered city from Chinese ports.

"The Japanese blockade is ineffective. The garrison consists of between fifty and sixty thousand troops, and the health of both soldiers and civilians is good. The damaged battleships have all been repaired and the harbor entrance cleared of obstructions. Immense new forts have been constructed and in my opinion the place is in no immediate danger of falling into the hands of the Japanese. The Japanese attack by land and sea was made on the 8th but was repulsed."

Fuller is the first correspondent to enter the place since it was blockaded.

There were huzzahs when Payne proposed Root for temporary chairman and when Oaell moved that he be accepted by the convention, but the demonstrations were not strong enough to shatter the nervous system. Then the convention was favored with a view of the sharp, keen, cold countenance of former Sec. of War Root as he advanced to sound the keynote of this campaign. His voice, at first husky, gradually became more resonant, and there was brief applause at the principal stages of his speech, especially when he told how the President had fostered honest industry and curbed the trusts, and encouraged irrigation.

Theodore Roosevelt were the last two words of the Chairman's splendid speech, and there was a storm of cheering from every part of the building. Flags and hats were brought into action and the Alaskan eagles waved on high.

When quiet was secured, the regular business was proceeded with, while thousands of spectators began leaving the hall.

At 2:10 p.m. the completed list of committees was read, and the convention adjourned until tomorrow.

Many delegates believe that with the ticket settled in advance and no situation to clear up, it is fruitless to drag the convention over two days.

The question of early adjournment rests entirely within the discretion of the convention. Chairman Payne, of the national committee, said there is a strong undercurrent of sentiment favorable to adjournment, and Foraker says he would not be surprised if the business convention concluded Wednesday night. Governor Black also is of the opinion that the convention ought to be put through with, as everything is cut and dried.
