TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

R. B. ACCIDENT.

MOUNT CARMEL, Penn., May 6.—Between ten and eleven o'clock last night a terrible accident occurred on the Philadelphia and Reading railroad, between this city and Locust Gap. A freight train, consisting of seventy-five cars bound for Williamsport became disconnected by breaking of coupling. The engine and three cars ran half a mile before the crew discovered that the train was divided. The first section awaited the arrival of second at the foot of a heavy grade and two brakemen losing control of the second section, dashed into the first section, causing an explosion in the third car, which was loaded with Dupont powder. Thirty persons were injured or killed. The loss in money is estimated at \$75,000.

WHAT A SET OF TEETH DID.

NEW YORK, May 6.—Mrs. Frances Murry, residing in West Fortieth street, 40 years of age, a native of England, died Friday in the New York hospital under very peculiar circumstances. A week ago Mrs. Murry was at the supper table with her husband, Alexander, when he made some remark which caused her to laugh. In the midst of the excitement her husband was startled to see her clutch her throat and gasp. He sprang to her assistance and was horrified to find she had swallowed four false teeth and the plate to which they were attached.

SPRINTER TRAVELING.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 6.—It was reported that Frank Lewis, the Corvallis, Oregon, sprinter, was in this city last week. Lewis is a seventy-five yard sprinter and it is thought he dropped into town incognito on the announcement that a professional handicap would be given here next month.

JUST RIGHT.

SALT LAKE, May 6.—The Territorial Democratic Convention was held yesterday at Ogden. Craig Chambers and Charley Williams were chosen as delegates to the St. Louis National Convention. Resolutions were adopted declaring that the Democrats of Utah cannot affiliate with Mormons. A number of Mormons were present at the convention as delegates, but the Committee on credentials refused to recognize them. It is therefore probable that the Mormons will hold an independent convention.

OVER FENCING.

HELENA, M.T., May 6.—A report has reached here of a terrible shooting scrape on Willow creek, about seven miles south of this place, in which S. T. Milroy and brother were dangerously, if not fatally shot by Pat Dooley, his son Johnny Campbell and Blair King. The cause is said to have been a dispute about fencing land.

NEW YORK, May 6.—The will of the late Rose Conk Ing, just discovered, dated Ulca, May, 1867, leaves his entire estate, valued at \$150,000, to Mrs. Conkling.

WEDDED.

LOS ANGELES, May 6.—Ex-Governor of California, John G. Downey, was married last evening at the cathedral to Mrs. Rose V. Kelly. The affair was conducted very quietly and the news was only learned to-day.
