WELL SAID.

The East Portland Packet says:

"Both great political parties are pledged by their platforms to revise the tariff, so as to reduce the revenues to the actual requirements of the government. It is a self-evident truth that unnecessary taxation is unjust taxation. The democrats in Congress, the great majority of whom favor tariff revision, are making an honest effort to relieve the people of their unnecessary and therefore unjust burdens of taxation. The scheme is not perfect; no human legislation is. But the democrats are making a sincere and earnest effort to redeem their promises to the people. The republicans in Congress, the great majority of whom are protectionists, are strongly pledged to reform the inequalities of the tariff, and are doing nothing in that direction. They are playing the part of obstructionists, spending their energies and the time of their constituents in simply 'blocking the way of tariff revision.' Now supposing for a moment—that is never probable—that the error is all on one side, is it excusable in the other to increase the difficulty, to refuse its aid, to embarrass those who have the management of affairs? What can be thought of the wisdom, the patriotism and the public spirit of those sapient republicans in Congress, who spend days in making long opposition speeches for purely partisan purposes, instead of doing something, suggesting something to relieve the people of the unjust burden of unnecessary taxation, which no one denies is a pressing and imperative necessity at this time?"

Under protection in the United States, in the manufacture of \$7,000,000,000 goods, the total of \$1,400,000,000 was paid in wages to the operatives. The wages paid in England in the manufacture of the like amount of goods, was \$784,000,000—or little more than one-half; and in Germany \$616,000,000—or less than one-half the wages of the operatives in the United States.—Portland News.

The News proves entirely too much. The object of the above is to show that protection secures high wages for labor. While wages are higher, it is true, in the United States where protection prevails than in England where free trade prevails, yet it is equally true that wages are relatively as much higher in free trade England as in Germany where protection is adhered to. So that it is plain to be seen that wages are not affected by protection. Men and corporations in employing labor get it as cheap as possible without regard to the amount of protection they receive at the hands of the government. Strange as it may seem to some, yet it is true that labor employed in the highly protected industries is less remunerative than in those lines that are unprotected. All of which explodes the false cry of protection to labor.
