ALBANY, OREGON.

A significant fact in American politics is the melting away of the enormous Republican majorities in the great states of the northwest. For many years these majorities ranged in several of these states from fifty to one hundred thousand. In 1880 Senator Conkling, at the Chicago Convention when Blaine's nomination was advocated by a Michigan delegation said, "anybody," meaning, of course, any Republican, "can carry Michigan." So it was at that time. Michigan had frequently given sixty and seventy thousand Republican majority. In 1884, only four years later, Michigan was saved to the Republican party by a beggarly majority of 3000, and only because the vice presidential candidate, General Logan, traversed the state on the eve of the election, and made the most earnest personal appeals to his Grand Army friends. Northwestern Democrats really believe Democratic chance for 1888 are good in Michigan, Wisconsin, Minnesota and even in Illinois. Republican politicians of course deny this, but it is wonderful to note how cautious they are in making estimates of the results. A western senator, a Republican presidential candidate, said today, in the course of conversation on political prospects in the west, that he thought the Republicans could carry Illinois by 10,000 and Michigan and Wisconsin by 5000 each.

As he was not talking for publication he of course expressed his honest sentiments. His estimate gives the Republicans a fairly narrow margin in these states which "anybody could carry" so short a time back.

## TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

### A Cyclone.

CHICAGO, May 11.—A cyclone of tremendous force swept over Northern Indiana to-night. The telegraph wires throughout a considerable extent are prostrated, and the extent of its ravages can only be formed from a few scattering reports. At Winnetka siding, on the Nickel Plate railroad, a train of sixteen freight cars was lifted from the track and distributed across the surrounding prairie. At Walath a number of houses were unroofed.

### Clatsop Co. Nominations.

ASTORIA, May 11.—The county democratic convention met at 2 o'clock this afternoon, and after organization went into caucus and decided upon nominations. Upon reopening the doors at 4:30 p. m. the following nominations were made: For State Senator J. F. Page; Representatives, John H. Smith and George Noland; County commissioners, John Warnstaff and James Brown; Sheriff, William G. Ross; Clerk, C. J. Trinchard; Treasurer, Isaac Bergman; Assessor, Thomas Logan; School Superintendent, C. R. Thompson; Coroner, W. H. Zumwalt.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 11.—A destructive fire occurred to-night at Fourth and Berry streets, near the Southern Pacific railroad buildings. It originated in the California cigar box factory, operated by Hooper, Hubbard & Company, and spread to the planing mill of Jewell, Hooper & Company, Fairweather's sash and door factory, and the factory of Jesse & Drew, stair builders. All of the buildings were entirely destroyed. A number of other smaller buildings occupied as dwellings also burned.

### After the Surplus.

WASHINGTON, May 11.—The house committee on postoffices to-day ordered a favorable report on Chairman Blount's bill to provide a general law for the erection of postoffice buildings. It provides for the appointment in the postoffice department of an architect and superintendent of instruction at a salary of \$4000 per year, who shall, with the assistant supervising architect of the treasury, prepare designs for postoffice buildings. The postmaster-general is authorized, in his discretion, to construct postoffice buildings at any place at which the gross postal receipts for two years or more shall have exceeded \$3000 in each year. No building erected under the act shall cost more than \$25,000. The sum of \$200,000 is to be appropriated, to be available during the current year, to carry out the purposes of the bill. The number of towns which would be entitled to postoffice buildings under the provisions of the bill is placed at 1500, and it is estimated that \$25,000,000 would be required to supply them all with buildings.
