THE BOARD OF TRADE.

Now that the Board of Trade is a fixed fact in this city, a few thoughts upon the good work which such organizations have in their power to do, may not be inappropriate. The very many incidental matters of public interest which this organization will be called upon from time to time to consider need not be now mentioned, but it is proper to mention the fact that the citizens of this city uniformly agree that the greatest good which this organization can do for the whole city and surrounding country will be the inducing of manufacturers of various commodities to establish plants here. It is needless to speak here of the varied and important advantages which this city offers to capitalists. Our fine water power, the vast resources of our agricultural surroundings, health, climate, cheapness of living, abundance of timber, raw materials, such as wool, straw, wood, etc., used in industrial productions, all combine to make Albany a place to be preferred above that of any other place in Oregon. While it is true that we want population, would it not be the part of wisdom to secure it as an incident of the building up and utilizing the manufacturing advantages of the city? Population without employment is a detriment rather than a benefit. These thoughts are thrown out as mere suggestions to induce people to reflect and look into these matters that so materially affect their interests.

Some one has been collecting facts about the fathers of United States Presidents, with this result: "Grover Cleveland is the only clergyman's son who has ever been elected President, though Arthur's father was a clergyman. The fathers of the Virginia Presidents—Washington, Jefferson, Madison and Monroe—were planters. John Tyler's father was a lawyer and a statesman, and John Adams, the father of John Quincy Adams, was by profession a lawyer. Grant's father was a tanner, Hayes, father a merchant, and the fathers of Garfield, Lincoln, Pierce, Fillmore, Polk, Van Buren and Jackson were farmers."

A few days ago we overheard a prominent cattleman and old resident of this county say he had voted the republican ticket for the past twenty years, had voted to protect an "infant industry" that had become such a powerful "infant" it had almost consumed his business and was driving him to the wall, but since the republican party had become the sheepman's party, he was a democrat straight out, and would vote that ticket from this time on.—Ochoco Review.

Talking with a republican the other day, he said there were several names on the county ticket he did not like, but he proposed to vote it straight, as this is presidential year and they were going for victory all along the line from constable to president. How can democrats hesitate to do their whole duty under this kind of threat?

FREE TRADE IRREVELANT.

It is a condition which confront us—not a theory. Relief from this condition may involve a slight reduction of the advantages which we award our home productions, but the entire withdrawal of such advantages should not be contemplated. The question of free trade is absolutely irrelevant; and the persistent claim made in certain quarters, that all effort to relieve the people from unjust and unnecessary taxation are schemes of so-called free-traders, is mischievous and far removed from any consideration for the public good.

The simple and plain duty which we owe the people is to reduce taxation to the necessary expenses of an economical operation of the Government, and to restore to the business of the country the money which we hold in the Treasury through the perversion of governmental powers. These things can and should be done with safety to all our industries, without danger to the opportunity for remunerative labor which our workmen need, and with benefit to them and all our people, by cheapening their means of subsistence and increasing the measure of their comforts.—Cleveland's Message.
