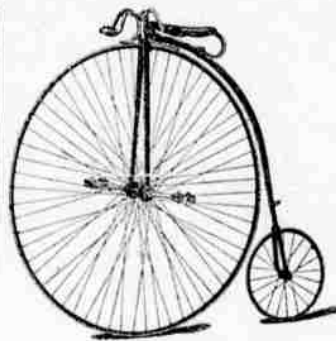
Jerry Shea says he has already called a jury of six men, "good and true," to set on the republican ticket just prior to the starting out of the procession June 5th up Salt river.
