TELEGRAPHIC NEWS

Very Sick.

WASHINGTON, May 25.—Gen. Sheridan is a very sick man, and physicians are in constant attendance upon him. His trouble is valvular affection of the heart, and he had several alarming sinking spells from which he rallied with difficulty, the last being the most severe of all. Failure of the heart's action has brought him near to death's door several times, and the fear is that a recurrence of the trouble may take him away suddenly at any moment.

Always Pours.

COLEMAN, W. T., May 25.—Wm. L. Powers' sawmill at Palouse City caught fire at noon to-day, and was totally destroyed, including a lumber yard containing many thousand feet. The fire is supposed to have originated from a spark. The loss is estimated at \$15,000. There was very little insurance, if any.

Must Hang.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 25.—The supreme court to-day affirmed the decision of the superior court in the case of Allen Golden-son, who shot and killed Mamie Kelly, a school girl, and was afterwards convicted and sentenced to be hanged. When the now noted Golden-son was informed of the decision of the supreme court that seals his fate, he gave little outward indication of his feelings, except a trembling of the knees and of the lips.

Completely Democratic.

PETERSBURG, Va., May 25.—The democrats yesterday elected their entire ticket, headed by Charles F. Collier for mayor, by 520 majority, and eight of the twelve councilmen. Thus the entire municipal government passes into the hands of democrats for the first time in eight years. A large number of negroes voted the democratic ticket.

A Coal Mine.

SEATTLE, W. T. May 25.—The situation at the Newcastle coal mine remains unchanged. The mine is shut down and the men all discharge. Just when work will be resumed is not known, as the order to close the mine was indefinite. The company is said to be comparatively indifferent about the matter, as the Franklin mine is in first-class order, and turning out about 800 tons a day.
