SWIFT'S SPEECH.

We were unable to hear Mr. Swift at the Court House last evening, but we are informed that he made the same speech here that he made at Salem and elsewhere. We give below what the *Capital Journal*, a very ardent republican paper, had to say of his speech at Salem:

Swift has not the faculty of entertaining an audience possessed by Col. Irish, and during his speech people left their seats in groups of ten and a dozen. He seemed to lack preparation. He has no understanding of the laws of trade, and he is so unfamiliar with the details that he cannot group classes of facts together without bringing them into collision. In discussing the wool tariff, he declared that a removal of the tax on imported wool would so swamp our country with this staple from Australia and South America, that the sheep industry in this country would be ruined, and wool raising among our farmers would become a lost art. Shortly after he ranked the United States among the greatest wool producers in the world, the countries above named not exceeding us in yield. These statements evidently fell on his ear as inconsistent, for he made the candid avowal that he was not an adept in figures, and if he erred to the extent of a hundred million, like Rip Van Winkle's last drink, so trifling a discrepancy mustn't count. It is a mistake on the part of the republican committee to put forth Mr. Swift as an exponent of financial science. There are some subjects, no doubt, he can intelligently discuss; but his equipment for the tariff, or any branch of political economy, is very incomplete. Col. Irish goes around winning commendation with his easy flowing eloquence, and Mr. Swift follows to refute his alleged sophistry and undo the effect. It is a bigger task than he can perform.

Mention was made in the *Herald* last week that Mr. Myers at Shedd's had evaded the discussion of the resolutions which it was said he had approved and out of which Mr. Irvine attempted to make some political capital. We are informed by a reliable gentleman that the discussion was discontinued at the special instance and request of the republican candidates for the legislature.

A correspondent of the *Oregonian* in attempting to show that Mr. Irish dictated the democratic platform adopted at Pendleton, says the committee was out over 36 hours. A gentleman who was on the committee says it was appointed at 3 o'clock the first day of the convention and made their report at 10 o'clock the next day. Another one nailed.

The *Sunday Welcome*, Ind., says: Every day but increases Gearin's strength and evidences the madness of his opponent. In counties where Hermann had a majority heretofore Gearin is certain to win and in Multnomah, the key to the whole situation, which gave Hermann his majority two and four years ago, the Democratic standard-bearer will hold the vote level, so that a safe majority of 1,000 may be counted on in the State. Let Democrats stand shoulder to shoulder and by all honorable means prevent the atrocious system of bribery resorted to and successfully consummated in this county every succeeding city and county election by the execrable ring, which holds the sack—the synonym of success.

The silliest thing out is the story telegraphed last night to the *Portland News* that Hermann's chances of carrying Linn county are excellent. This is the worst kind of campaign rot. Hermann is not as popular in Linn county as he was two years ago.
